

Togo Under Fire.

A Japanese official who was on Togo's flagship the Mikaso, during the naval engage ment at Port Arthur, last August, in a recent issue of the Independent, relates how the admiral carried himself during that battle. Togo directed the battle from the bridge, refusing to take advantage of the conning tower. When the Mikasa, leading the column, had intercepted the flight of the Russian fleet, the fight grew hot about the flag-ship.

"A 6-inch shell struck a chart-room just under the bridge, killing every man in it.

The fragments flew about Togo's staff, wounding four of them. Togo, after seeing that the wounded officers were attened to. went on using his glass.

"There was aboard an old valet of the admiral, a feudal retainer of his family. This man, when he heard that the admiral was in a place of great danger, broke all Jap etiquette and rushed to the gangway leading to the bridge. There he hesitated, but a shell struck just then, wounding Imperial Prince Fushimi, who was aboard. The valet made a rush and prostrated himself before the admiral, begging him, for the good of Japan, to go to the conning-tower. The admiral, 'with a half-amused seriousness,' gave a kind refusal. "Just then the 6-inch shell struck the chart-room and scattered the staff. A flying splinter wounded the valet on both legs. He was carried to the hospital, howling protests. From his cot he implored the surgeons to carry the admiral away by force. Finally, the deck officers surrounded Togo and almost dragged him to the conning-tower. Togo laughed indulgently as they locked him in. "This first-hand observer of the Japanese fleet in action made note of the perfect coolness which prevailed on board, the outcome of Togo's iron discipline. From the admiral down they fought like clockwork, without excitement, without cheering. Togo was a bronze and blue statue. A shell killed a whole gun crew in the secondary battery. The men at the next gun were spattered with the blood of their comrades, yet they kept up their regular fire without the loss of a second."

A Monster of the Deep. (New York 'Tribune')

The latest type of British battleship gives startling answer to the recent suggestion that the day of huge floating fortresses is past. The battle of the Sea of Japan, as we have hitherto pointed out, demonstrated nothing more clearly than the supreme and essential value of such ships, and it was to be supposed that as a result the great naval power would proceed with the construction of big battleships, and perhaps also with their further development in size and strength. But even before that decisive and most instructive battle the authorities of the world's greatest navy had determined to build a ship far outclassing any other in existence and literally appaling in its destructive potency. The 'Dreadnaught,' as the monster of the

deep is to be called, will be laid down at Portsmouth next fall, and will be put into commission within two years. We shall appreciate its size and strength most adequately if we compare, or contrast, some of its details with those of other great battleships. Probably the most formidable ships now in existence or building are the Japanese 'Katori' building at Barrow, and the United States vessel of the 'New Hampshire' class. In displacement the 'Katori' measures 15,-950 and the 'New Hampshire' 16,000 tons. while the 'Dreadnaught' will measure no less than 18,000 tons. In speed the Katori' is rated at eighteen and a half and the 'New Hampshire' at eighteen knots, while the 'Dreadnaught,' using turbines, is to make twenty knots. In these elements therefore, the British monster decidedly outclasses all rivals.

Sold Out.


One of Nantucket's summer visitors strolled into the little shop kept by an old man, a native of the place.



What a Cigar Contains.

Analysis of the cigar, its leaf, smoke and ash, produces remarkable results. The ordinary smoker who saunters into a cigar store, importantly approaches the long glass case, blandly says: "Give me a Hotstuff, a Stencher or a Neverdraw," bites off the end, daintily revolves it in his fingers while holding it to the lighter, complacently puffs and surveys himself in the mirror, really knows very little of what he does.

A scientist finds in the smoke, water in a vaporous state, soot or free carbon, carbonic acid, carbonic oxide and oily nicotine in which are found acetic, formic, butyric, valeric and proplonic acids, prussic acid, crecsote and carbolic acid, ammonia, sulphuretted hydrogen, phyridine, viridine, picoline, lutidine, collodine, parvoline, coridine and rubedene.

In the leaf are found nicotia, tobacco, camphor, gum, chlorophyll, malate of lime, sundry albuminoids, malic acid, woody fibre and various salts. In the ash exist potash, soda, magnesia, lime phosphoric acid, sulphuric acid, silica and chlorine.

This is the result of analysis of an alltobacco cigar. An English parliamentary report showing adulteration of tobacco gives the following as ingredients in very cheap cigars:

Sugar, alum, flour or meal, rhubarb leaves, saltpetre, fuller's earth, starch, malt-commonings, chromate of lead, peat mose, molasses, burdock leaves, common salt, endive leaves, lamp-black, gum, red dye, a black dye compound of vegetable red, iron "I once advertised," said a contractor, and licorice, scraps of newspaper, cinnamon stick, cabbage leaves and straw-brown paper." It is said the free carbon acts as an irritant; that ammonia bites the tongue and exercises a solvent influence on the blood; that the carbonic acid produces sleepiness, "I," said John Mark, a man in white headache and lassitude, and that the nicotine causes tremor, palpitation of the heart and paralysis.


