**DR. RANKIN LEAVES US.**

The Severity of Our Climate Compels Him to Seek A Home Elsewhere.

Dr. W. D. Rankin has gone out from among the people of Carleton County. On Saturday he left Woodstock for the far away province of British Columbia, where in the city of Vancouver he will make his home and practise his profession. It is not too much to say that none of our citizens could have left the county whose loss would have been more keenly felt. As a physician he will be missed by many for he had a large practice. He was every ready to minister to the wants of the diseased and suffering. When a call came he went forth to his duty, whether he was needed to attend a well-to-do patient who resided but a few doors away or a poor sufferer who lived far out in the country, and from whom he knew he could expect no financial remuneration for his services. He was a public-spirited citizen and a man of sterling character. To know him was to be helped. Though we realize that we will miss him we can perhaps never thoroughly realize the extent of our loss. That he will be successful in the highest sense in his new home is the hearty wish and the certain conviction of the people of Carleton County.

On Friday evening a large number of the doctor's many friends met in Graham's Opera House to present him with a token of their respect and esteem.

After some explanatory remarks by Mr. J. C. Hartley, who with Messrs B. Frank Smith, M. P. P., I. Edward Sheasgreen, G. E. Balmain and C. He then read the following address:—

During the years that you have been so resident in Woodstock you have endeared yourself to all classes alike by kindly sympathy with those who were unfortunate enough to be cast upon beds of sickness and your ever readiness to respond to a call either by night or day, for your attendance and treatment of the sick and in many instances as we know, where it could not be deemed anything but a labor of love.

While regretting your removal from our midst we cannot help feeling like congratulating the place where you will take up your residence upon acquiring what we consider one of the best medical practitioners in the Province, and in addition to that a warm hearted friend and good citizen.

We trust you may prosper in your new home and that you and your family may enjoy the blessings of life to the fullest extent.

We would ask you to accept as a slight token of the esteem in which you are held by your fellow citizens in the County the accompanying cabinet and we hope that you may live long to use it.

**Sent to Dorchester.**

On the 24th inst., Joseph Robichaud, who claims to be a native of the County of Northumberland, was arrested on the charge of stealing the sum of \$14.20 from Harry L. Sewell of the Parish of Brighton, on Wednesday last. He was taken before Justice Barnett at Hartland who found the evidence against the prisoner sufficient to commit him for trial. On Saturday he was taken before His Honour Judge Carleton that he might elect whether he would be tried by judge and jury at the regular sitting of the County Court which meets in October, or whether he would be tried forthwith by Judge Carleton under the Speedy Trials act. The prisoner chose the latter course and pleaded guilty to the charged preferred against him. He had no attorney.

His Honor asked Robichaud several questions and ascertained that he was twenty-two years of age, that he had neither father or mother living and that he had been working as a farm hand in various parts of Carleton and York Counties. He did not speak English very well and did appear to be a particularly bright young man. His Honour before delivering the sentence gave the prisoner some excellent advice. He remarked upon the threefold object of the law in providing for the imprisonment of those persons who were found guilty of its violation. He stated that in the first place it is considered that the offender should suffer the penalty provided because he has outraged the law, secondly he is imprisoned as a warning to others, but thirdly and most particularly he is confined in prison in order that he may have time and opportunity to reflect upon the seriousness of his offence and resolve to lead a better life.

The prisoner was sentenced to two years imprisonment in the penitentiary at Dorchester, where Deputy Sheriff Foster took him on Monday.
