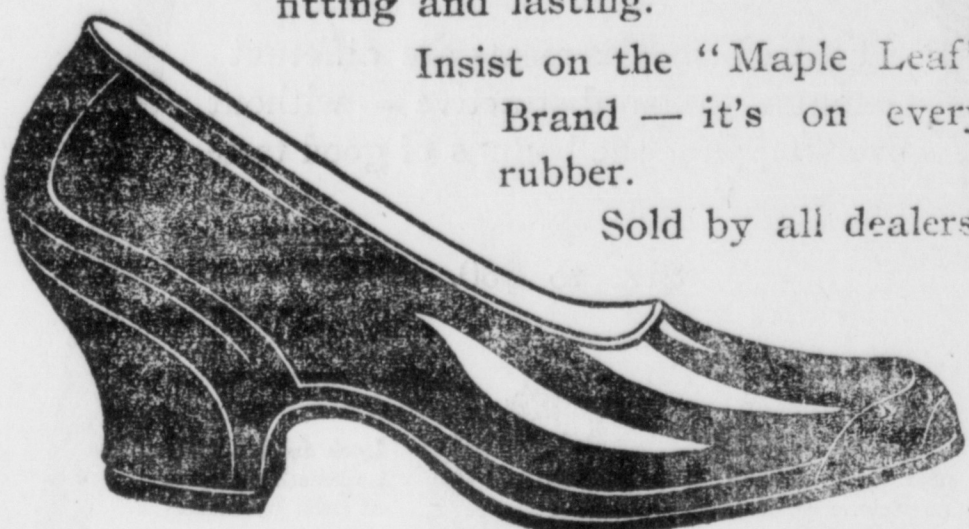

Grooves in an Indian Arrow.

In making the Indian arrow, three small undulating grooves are cut on the shaft, running down to the head from the lower end of the feathers. This has attracted the attention of some of the ethnologists, who gave the matter considerable study and wisely concluded that the little lines were made for the blood to run through, or that they represented lightning. An old Omaha, who had the reputation of being very skillful in cutting the grooves in arrow shafts, was called by the chief to do that work for him on some arrows he was making. The chief himself was a fine arrow-maker, but he recognized the skill of the old man in this particular line. While the work was in progress, the chief's son, who had reached the inquisitive age, and was looking on with wide-eyed interest, suddenly asked: "Venerable man, why are you making those crooked lines?" The chief gave a hearty laugh and said: "Father, tell him, for he will be making arrows himself some day, and he should know." "Every sapling," answered the old man, "out of which the arrow is made has some defect, however faultless it may appear. The good arrow-maker takes a great deal of pains to smooth out and straighten the imperfections by oiling and heating. But the wood, in time, will spring back because of its inherent defects, unless these grooves are cut in the shaft soon after seasoning and straightening."—Southern Workman.

Tensile Strength of Common Paper.

Few people realize the strain to which the paper on which newspapers are printed is subjected, says a writer in The Paper Buyer. "On a press running at a speed of 800 feet per minute the paper passing over bars and rollers is subjected to a pull of from seven to fourteen pounds per running inch. This means that a roll of paper seventy-two inches wide must resist a strain of 720 pounds under a direct pull. In press construction great care is taken, of course, that the pull is direct, the web of paper being supported in such a way that an equal strain is put on every inch of its width. When breaks occur the fault is sometimes that of the press but oftener some defect in the paper is the cause. Presses are less subject to change than paper in fact it is seldom that two lots of paper are exactly alike. The conditions under which paper is manufactured cannot be controlled with certainty. Water, pulp and mixture, general manipulation and other conditions make it almost impossible to guarantee uniform results. To the credit of the paper maker let it be said that in spite of difficulties he is often able to point to records of presses running for weeks at a time without a single break."

No Time For Fools.

When George Westinghouse, as a young inventor, was trying to interest capitalists in his automatic brake, the device which now plays so important a part in the operation of railroad trains, he wrote a letter to Commodore Cornelius Vanderbilt, president of the New York Central Railroad Company, carefully explaining the details of the invention. Very promptly his letter came back to him endorsed in big, scrawling letters, in the hand of Commodore Vanderbilt—"I have no time to waste on fools."

Afterwards, when the Pennsylvania Railroad had taken up the automatic brake, and it was proving very successful, Commodore Vanderbilt sent young Mr. Westinghouse a request to call on him. The inventor returned the letter, endorsed on the bottom as follows: "I have no time to waste on fools."—[Success.

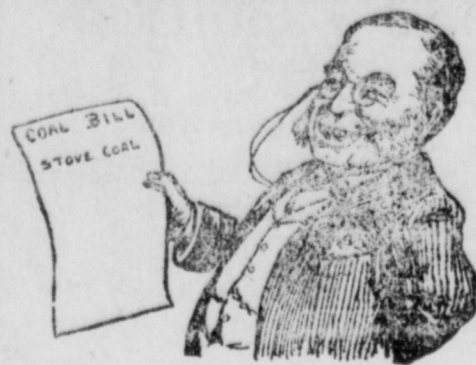
