School Closing Exercises.

The public closing exercises of the town schools were held on Wednesday evening in Graham's Opera House. Every available seat was taken and a large number of persons stood during the entire evening. Mr. H. Paxton Baird, Chairman of the Board of School Trustees, presided in his usual efficient manner. The Mayor with some of the Council Board, several of the School Trustees, Inspector Meagher, Principal Harrison, Archdeacon Neales and several other gentlemen occapied seats on the platform.

Chairman Baird made a neat and pointed introductory speech, in which he dwelt briefly upon the trouble between the School Trustees and the Town Council, asserting that it was to be deplored that certain irresponsible parties had been able to secure a place at the Council Board. In his succint statements he set forth convincing arguments to show that the blame for the non-payment of the teachers' salaries rests upon the shoulders of the city fathers.

Inspector Meagher then addressed the graduating class. His address was so forceful and appropriate that we have printed it at full length elsewhere in our columns. Miss Faye Camber rendered a vocal solo very sweetly and generously responded to an encore. Mrs-G. G. Hare and Mrs. R. E. Holyoke also delighted the audience with vocal selections during the evening and each graciously complied with the vigorous request for an encore. Mr. Roy Watt, the winner of the William Connell prize for the best essay on The St. John River, read his essay, which was a most excellent production and one that would do credit to a far older student. Miss Eva Newcomb, the Valedictorian, read one of the best valedictories that have ever been heard at the closing of the Woodstock schools. The remainder of the evening was taken up with the presentation of prizes, with bits of history of the Council-School Board tug-of-war sandwiched in at intervals. The speeches were many of them too long, and they were by all means too numerous. The audience got very ared of them and consequently kept indifferent order. So much time was taken up in the presentation of prizes to the children who artend the schools in the College build. ing that the presentations to the pupils of the Broadway school had to be made in one consignment, and that a hurried one. This should not occur next year. It may appear a matter of small consequence to an adult, but closing night is the childrens' night and the enjoyment of a large number of them should not be marred by what to them may have the appearance of partiality.

The old dispute between the Light and Water departments regarding the apportionment of the appropriation was renewed on Coun. Nicholson's report of the special committee. On Councillor Leighton's motion it was decided that the matter should stand in abeyance until Friday evening. The Clerk was ordered to bring to that evening's meeting the memorandum of the contract between the town and the Engineer of the Water

On Councillor Leighton's motion it was decided to made an appropriation to the Fire Department for Carnival purposes, \$15 00 to go to Company No. 1, \$15.00 to Company No. 2, \$10.00 to the engine and \$10.00 to the lauder truck.

On Councillor Stevens' inquiry it was learned that the Carnival Committee were guilty of les majisie, as they had not yet invited the elders of the city to ride in their chariots in the Carnival procession. The hope was expressed that the committee would not jeoparlize the success of the entire Carnival by entirely overlooking this matter.

He denounced in scathing terms, but in terms none too strong those town counciliors who have during the last two or three m nths "sought to belittle and degrade the cause of education by opposing the psyment of the teachers' salaries." Have not the town comcil paid all who are employed by them from the man in the street up to the highest paid official. They have paid everything to sight, and yet the teachers, the majority of woom, we are ashamed to say, get less pay than a common labourer, were let go begging for their small share. The school board a-ked the council last year to assess for a sufficient amount to pay the teachers and for o her pur poses for the year running from July 1-t last year to July 1st this year. The council taxed the citizens for that amount, and the taxes have been and are still being collected since the council has refused to pay the school trustees out of last years assessment. The ratepayers may very properly ask what this money will be used for. The statement made by Councillor Nicholson as to the cau-e of the trouble will not go down.

The beginning of the trouble it is well known was that the Mayor and some councillors were mad at the school board because they would not borrow funds on their own account. This the school board cannot do legally. The credit of the town is sood enough to enable the council to borrow all the money they need for leguimate purposes; and to expect the school heard to personally become responsible for the necessary funds to carry on the business of the schools, so that the debit balance of the council will appear smaller in the public eye, was a small piece of business for any body of men.

We have it on the best of authority that the council has never asked a helping hand from the school board. All that they have heard from the Council has been one continu ed tirade of abuse. What game the council is playing while throwing dust into the eyes of the ratepayers, will appear in du sesson. The end is not yet.
