The One Remedy of the World's Woes.

In the world's darkest hour and most utter hopelessness a young man stood up in a little assembly in the most despised village of one of Rome's conquered provinces and proposed a complete remedy for all the world's woes. The sun of the world's hope had set in night. All its civilizations had been tried and failed. Nineveh was buried. Egypt was dead. Greece had been overrun by barbarians, and its beautiful art was in pathetic fragments. Rome was already sinking into a Sodom sea of debauchery, and the horse woofs were already prancing in the far North, in whose steps the grass should never grow again. Civilization, government, art, philosophy had all failed. Nay, even religion had failed most conspicuously of all. Men had sought out many inventions, but they had ended in degrading men into an imbecile terror of malignant gods. The one religion into which the ever living God whose name was loving kindness had come, God whose name was loving kindness, keeping mercy for a thousand generations of them that love Him and keep His commandments, had degenerated till its chief ministers, trusting in themselves only that they were righteous, had come to despise others.

Just then was the effective remedy of all the world's woes proposed. He said: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon Me; because He anointed Me to preach good tidings to the poor, release to the captives, sight to the blind, liberty to the broken into pieces, and to proclaim the acceptable year of the Lord," or the Lord's jubilee. The factors of this remedy were, first, the Spirit of the Lord God Almighty—all wise, all-sufficient in actual application. It had ample back-ground and illustration in history. It had emancipated slaves by the million in Egypt. It had unclenched the mailed hand of Babylon and led the captives home, their mouths filled with singing. Pharaoh and his hosts overthrown in the Red Sea, Og, King of Bashan, Sennacherib and his host of dead men, were historic monuments of this sufficient power and its application.

The second factor was the human co-operative agency, "Hath anointed Me" to do, to direct and use the infinite agency. It is altogether consonant with all the work done in the world. It is co-operation between God and man. Paul may plant and Apollos may irrigate all in vain unless God gives the increase. Vain were gravitation, gravitation, steam, and lightning till man came to direct their energies. Even the Christ on earth sought human co-operation in His greatest miracles. "Fill the water pots," "Roll ye away the stone."

What were the agencies in this case? (1) Generally raise the spiritual and mental life to such a height of grandeur that the inflictions of a brutish Roman soldiery should be unregarded. This was a supernal height, meant to be the masters of the world and trained in that belief, had been made the basest slaves. Rome recruited her legions from the cheapest and most savage material. If any wanted a cloak he took it. If he wearied of his burden he compelled any man he met to take it a mile. No Jew owned his home, himself, his wife, or daughter. Virginians saving his daughter by his sword in her bosom was no singular case. What was to be done? If compelled to go a mile, go two. If the cloak was taken, forbid not to take coat also. If smitten on the right cheek, turn the other. That is, going the second mile, giving up cloak, taking another blow in the face are not so harmful as a spirit of raging anger at these insults. The same about anxiety for the morrow; it does not lighten to-morrow's burden and it does lessen the strength to bear it. Christ exemplified all these things himself. He was smitten, had His garments taken, was insulted more than any other man—but answered never a word. A soul's serenity can be so great that no wind of adversity can ruffle it. It says "Peace, be still," to any sudden Galilean tempest. God can help more than man can harm.

The next element of this remedy was the uplift of ninety-nine hundredths of the human race. A few rulers had taken care that the rest of the world should yield their riches to them. The old Mogul ruler put twelve and a half million dollars into making the Peacock throne when few of his subjects had a stool to sit on. Above all, the blare of the trumpets of the kings, God heard the groanings of the poor. When He would build up Jerusalem He gathered the outcasts, lifted up the meek, and healed the broken-hearted. All that was clear gain from what had been waste material. It took the vast majority of the human race from the minus side of greatness and put it on the plus. The principle of greatness is to have every element contribute to the desired end. Let not even the weak be a drag or discount on the strong. Nay, let strength be so used as to increase itself by fitting the weak to be strong enough to help others. The full force of this Divine remedy is seen in the fact that infinite strength is applied to take away old disabilities of blindness,

poverty, broken-heartedness, and imprisonment, and let all these hear the proclamation of God's jubilee year. Great was the joy of all Judah when the sound of the trumpet proclaimed that all the disabilities of debt and slavery were at an end. But the jubilee is worth far more as a symbol of the Divine emancipation from all evil. Resonant and significant was the old slave song, "De year ob jubilee am come." More resonant, significant, and jubilant will be the song over the whole world when the Spirit of the Lord God shall anoint every me of the Church universal to apply the one perfect remedy for all the world's woes.—Christian Advocate.
