SUNBURN.

Cucumber Lotion for Freckles, and a
Lemonade Cure For Sunburn.

The pretty girl who wants to look nice in
the summer says she has discovered a sun-
burn cure, and, like the old king who inven-
ted lemonade in the fairy tale, she just
happened upon it.

"One time," says she, "when I came in
from a surf bath, with my face perfectly
scorching, I hastily mixed up some things
which lay on my dressing table. I had a
bottle of boracic acid and alcohol, of which I
am very fond as a cooling lotion.

"Some of this I hastily poured into a cut-
glass bowl; with it I mixed talcum powder
and lemon juice, to form a paste, which I
plastered all over my face. It dried rather
cakey after a time, but you have no idea how
it took the heat out, and by evening my skin
was comparatively cool."

The mistakes most people make is in put-
ting water on the face after a bad case of
sunburn. The face should not be bathed,
but well massaged with cold cream. After
two hours or more bathe repeatedly with hot
water and steam with hot cloths.

It is very foolish for the summer girl to
say she does not care how burned she gets.
Sunburn hardens and toughens the skin, in-
deed, too long exposure to the sun burns
and deadens the hair and even sunburns the
eyes, making them bloodshot. The fair-skinned
person—one who burns very easily—should
always put a thin coat of cold cream on the
face and neck, especially the nose, with tal-
cum rubbed well over before going into the
surf. For if she does not wear a brimmed
hat—and it is very hard to enjoy a bath in
such a head covering—she is bound to suffer.

There is no place where the sun blisters
like on the water. No one ever yet has
discovered anything becoming about sunburn.

In the evening when the summer girl
wants to put on a pretty ball gown and look
cool and comfortable, a red face is trying,
to say the least. So such small precautions as
a little care may give are well worth trying.

Cucumber milk is the best thing in all the
wide world for a complexion that is yellow
or speckled with freckles, or dulled with tan.
Also very nice to use as a cleaning agent.
Slice but do not peel three good-sized cuc-

umbers; add half a cup of water and boil
until pulp is soft; strain and cool. To one
and a half ounces of the cucumber juice add
an equal amount of alcohol. This makes
three ounces of cucumber essence. In this
dissolve one-fourth of an ounce of powered
castile soap. Let stand over night, next
morning adding eight ounces of cucumber
juice, one-half ounce of oil of sweet almonds
and fifteen ounces of tincture of benzoin.
Pour in the oil very slowly, shaking the
bottle well. Keep in cool place.

The dealer assumed an air of reflection.

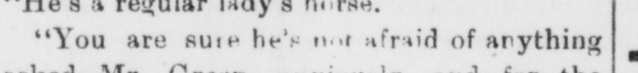
"Well, there is one thing that he has al-

on dogs agin."

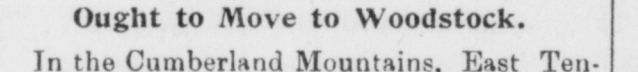
