Canadian Reciprocity.

The esteemed Tribune regards Canadian reciprocity as a fanciful issue. It is convinced that the Massachusetts advocates of closer trade relations with the Dominion are chasing a political will-o'-the-wisp.

The real opposition to their program," adds The Tribune, "centres not on Washington, but in Ottawa. They should shift their base of operation from New England to Canada."

The premises from which this conclusion is reached are that Canada has of late years developed a commercial policy without regard to the United States and that, in declining to sanction a meeting of the joint high commission to consider the question of reciprocity, the Canadian government definitely arrayed itself against that principle. It is quite true that Canada has evolved a commercial policy which leaves the United States practically out of consideration, but that policy is the creation, not of choice, but of circumstances, and would undoubtedly be abandoned if access could be had to markets which are now closed to the Canadian exporter.

As to the interpretation put upon the action of the Canadian premier, in response to Mr. Fairbanks' request for a reconvention of the joint high commission, we respectfully but firmly submit that The Tribune is in error. Sir Wilfrid Laurier believed then, and we think, still believe, that in the absence of any well-defined movement in congress for the establishment of more intimate trade relations between the two countries the purely deliberate and recommendatory powers of the commission could be of no avail. We think, too, that in taking this stand he was eminently right. Canada has made all the advances in the direction of reciprocity that she is ever likely to make. Overtures are now due from this side of the line. The Massachusetts propagandists are pursuing no will-o'-the-wisp. They are endeavouring to create and crystallize sentiment in congress with which the future of reciprocity entirely rests.—Brooklyn Eagle.

Lord Roberts' Rifle Shooting.

Lord Roberts writes a long letter advocating the more general practice of rifle shooting in all parts of the country, and appeals for contributions towards a fund of £100,000 "for the encouragement of rifle shooting as a national pastime."

In the course of the letter he says that in the middle ages the long bow was the national weapon of England. Law and custom enjoined that all freeman should be trained in its use, and every village had its butts. The skill in archery thus acquired won for us the great victories of Falkirk, Crecy, Poitiers and Agincourt, and made British infantry "the most formidable which Europe has seen since the dissolution of the Roman empire."

Proceeding, his lordship says he cannot too strongly point out to the people of this country the necessity for their recognizing their responsibility for giving practical proof of their interest in the efficiency of the land forces. "I am convinced that it is a matter of the utmost importance, not only to the regular army and auxiliary forces of this country, but to the empire at large, that rifle shooting should be made a national pursuit, and skill with the rifle a national accomplishment in the same manner that archery and skill with the long bow were so considered in the olden days in England. 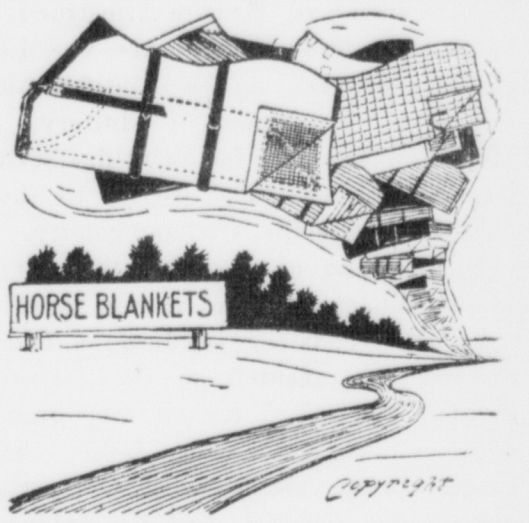
