Divorce Court.

Two matrimonial alliances were dissolved by Judge Gregory in the divorce court in Fredericton on Saturday. The case of Ellen M. Armstrong vs. William Armstrong, which has been pending for six years, was disposed of, the court granting the plaintiff an absolute divorce on the ground of adultery. J. C. Hartley was proctor for plaintiff, and the case was undefended. The parties to the suit belong to Glassville, Carleton county.

In the case of Cassie M. Wheeler vs. G. Henry Wheeler, also a Carleton County case tried at Woodstock in June, a decree of divorce was granted to the plaintiff. A divorce was asked for on the ground of adultery, and the court found that the charges were sustained. J. C. Hartley was proctor for plaintiff, and no defence was offered.

A Boy's Experience.

At Presque Isle, Friday, the hose waggon in going to a fire ran over a lad of sixteen years, Ray Price, son of Humphrey Price, whose home is in Canterbury, N. B., and works for Mooney & Clark, injuring one leg. The fore wheel of the waggon passed across his chest diagonally. The boy continued in an effort to escape even after one wheel had passed over him, and as he doubled up and rolled over between the fore and hind wheels the step caught him behind the ear, scraped across his right cheek, knocking out one or two teeth, and the hind wheel passed across his body a little below where the fore wheel had passed. The boy got up somewhat dazed, but was able to walk to Mr. Hemple's house, and was later removed to the Cottage Hotel. In a couple of hours he was on the street listening to the different versions of the affair as given by various parties who saw it.

Train Arrangement and Special Rates, Woodstock Carnival, July 14 and 15.

For the above tickets will be on sale from all Atlantic Division Stations in New Brunswick, and from Vanceboro and Aroostook County Stations in Maine for all trains July 13th and 14th and the a. m. trains of July 15th at single first class fare for the round trip, good for return up to and including Monday, July 17th. In addition, special low rate of \$1.15 will be named from Fredericton and intermediate stations on the Gibson branch to Woodstock, July 14th, also special low rate of \$1.25 from St. Stephen by regular trains, Friday, July 14th. On the same date an extra train will be run to leave Edmundston at 6.00 a. m., Presque Isle 7.00 a. m., making all intermediate stops, reaching Woodstock about 10.45 a. m., special rate of \$1.60 from Edmundston and points on the Edmundston branch, and rate of \$1.25 from Presque Isle, and points on the Presque Isle branch. This train will also carry any regular business offering from points south of Aroostook. On July 15th Plaster Rock train fifty-seven will be held at Woodstock until 6.30 p. m., and will then run through to Plaster Rock, and will carry excursionists returning to Presque Isle, Edmundston and intermediate stations. An extra train will be run in connection with number fifty-seven from Plaster Rock to Presque Isle and Edmundston; also on same date Gibson branch train number thirty-one for Fredericton will be held until

7.00 p. m. to accommodate excursionists from Fredericton and points on the Gibson branch. On Friday and Saturday, July 14th and 15th, extra train will be run between Houlton and Woodstock to leave Houlton at 7.00 p. m. each evening running through to Woodstock, returning will leave Woodstock at 8.30 p. m. each evening. This special train arrangement, with the low rates named should insure a large attendance at the Carnival, especially as this is the large event of Carleton County this year.

Are Fast Trains The Safest.

(Scientific American.)

The chances of the engine breaking through or jumping over a misplaced switch and taking the main line again beyond it, would be greater in a fast train than in a slow train. . . . On the straight stretches of the line the fast train, because of its higher velocity, is less likely to be thrown from the track by some obstruction than the slow train.

The writer was once on an engine that was thundering down grade, through the "Bad Lands" of Dakota, with a ten-car train behind it, at a speed of over 60 miles an hour, when the engine struck and swept through a band of wild horses that dashed out of a neighboring canyon across the track just as the train was upon them. The engine and the train kept the rails unharmed. At another time he was on an engine that was crawling slowly up grade, when a small band of sheep crossing the tracks proved enough to derail the engine.

It takes but a very small force to deflect a billiard ball that is rolling slowly across a billiard table, but if that same ball were moving at the rate of 100 feet a second (a frequent speed for these fast expresses) it could only be deflected by the exercise of considerable force.

It is the instinctive recognition of this fact that has led some engineers, when they have seen that they must hit a comparatively light

obstruction, to increase rather than retard the speed of the train.

Indeed, it is a matter of record that on one occasion the Twentieth Century Limited cut through immediately a box-car that had been thrown across the track directly in front of it with so little disturbance to the train that the passengers knew nothing of the occurrence. On a slow train a derailment would have been almost certain.

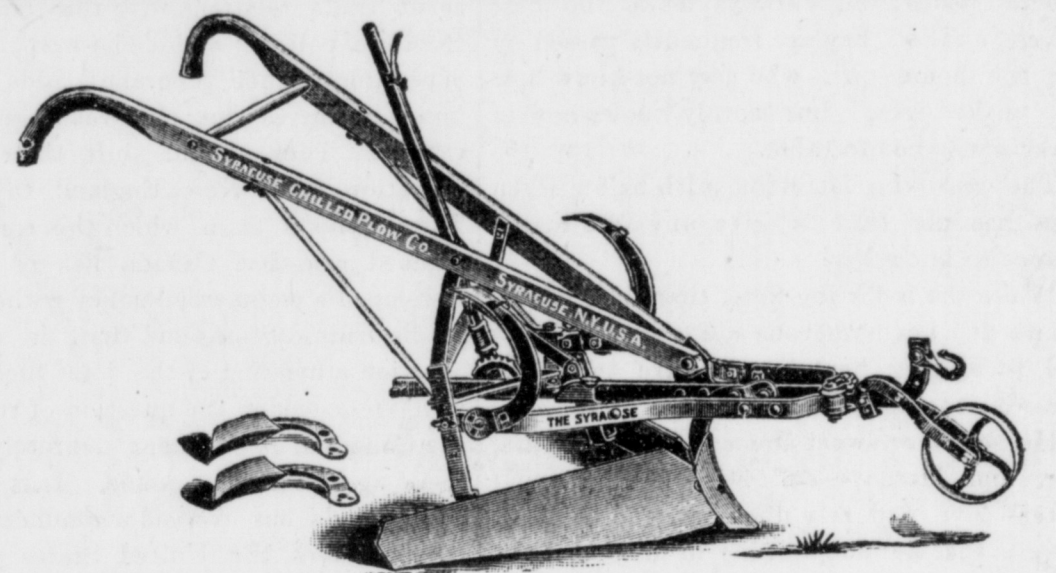
