**WHOLLY BAD.**

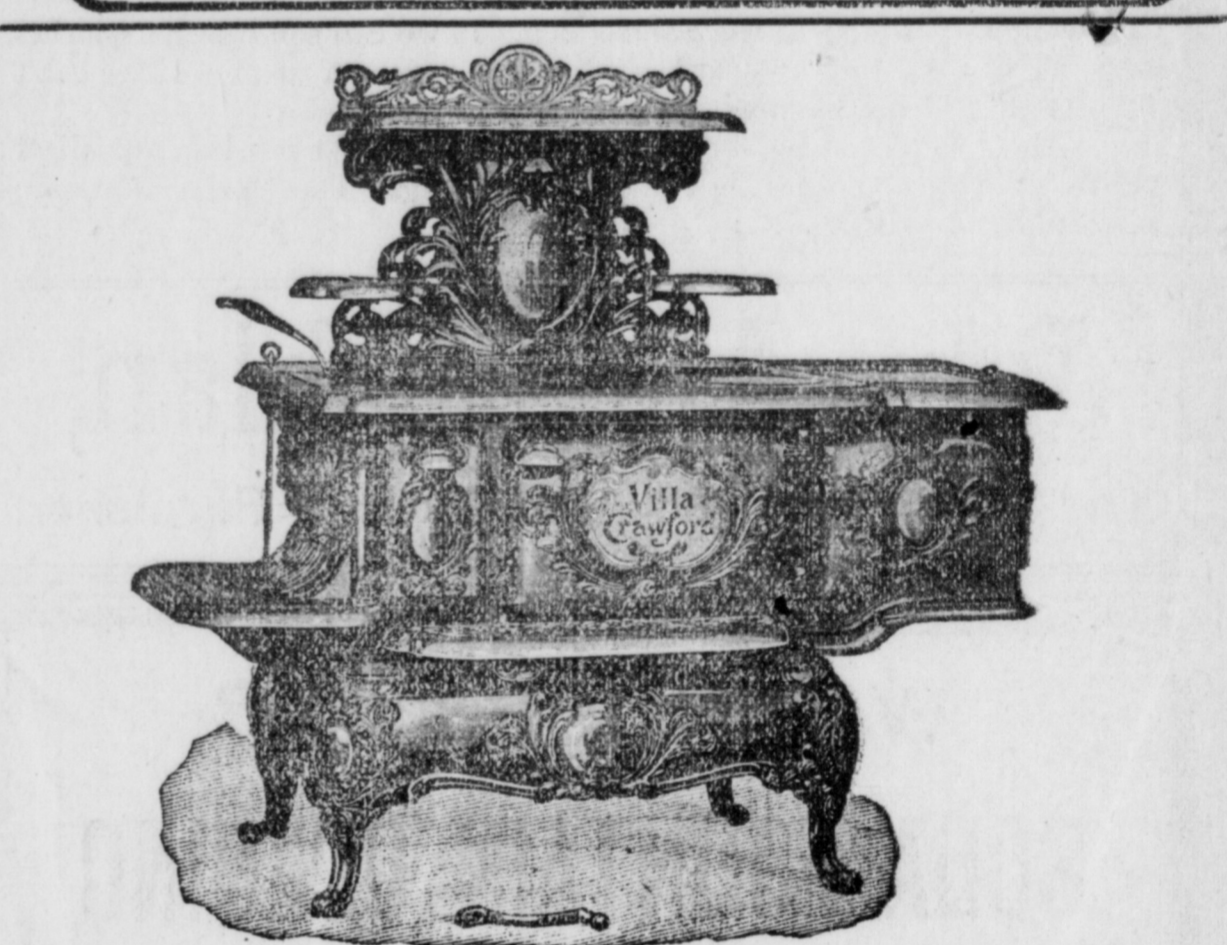
We have gone into the realm of political
