Killing Their Export Trade.

(Hartford Times, Dem.)
"It has been found," says the Chicago Chronicle, "upon investigation, that no less than 132 of the leading manufacturing concerns of the United States have been moved by various causes to establish branch plants in Canada, and fifteen of these have their principal establishments in Chicago. The Illinois Manufacturers' Association is going to give attention to the matter shortly and consider whether anything can be done to render this location of branch plants in a neighboring country unnecessary."

There are three or more manufacturing concerns in Hartford, we believe, which now have Canadian plants. One large local concern has two of them. This is the natural and necessary result of the present United States tariff system which tends to encourage the establishment of factories in other countries even more rapidly than here.

A tariff which protects the American workman is a good thing and should be maintained. But a tariff system which operates to encourage the building of branches of American factories all over the world is not a tariff for the benefit of the American workman. We might have had an open market in Canada for everything we produce if our government had been willing to enter into a low-tariff agreement at the right time with the Canadians. Our Dingleys and Mark Hannas would not permit this to be done. They forced the Canadians to increase their own tariff on imports from the United States, thereby compelling those who desire to sell their products in Canada to erect factories there. We are doing the same thing in respect to Germany, France and other countries. Even in England there is likely soon to be a tariff on American manufactured products, which will close that market to the American workmen.

How long is it going to take for the wage-earners of the United States to get their eyes open to the true nature of what is known as the stand-pat idea? We must modify our tariff or suffer greatly in the near future. At present the tendency is to force our manufacturers to provide themselves with factories all over the round globe, in order to be able to sell what they wish to produce.

Juxtaposition of Names.

Experiment With Seals.

We read in the press despatches of Saturday of the high prices brought in London this year for the British Columbia catch of seals. On account of the small catch prices

have advanced forty per cent. and they will probably continue to advance as the demand for this high-class fur increases and the supply diminishes. The average price for skins in 1890 was \$40, on a catch of 43,000. This year the average price was \$125 for 13,000 skins.

The suggestion has been made several times that the Canadian government should try to colonize the Alaska seal in the Hudson Bay and the other Arctic waters on the eastern and northern side of Canada, with a view of the establishment of seal fisheries there. There may be reason why this attempt would not succeed, but there is only one thing to do, and that is to try it.

If it succeeded it would give Canada a practical monopoly of one of the finest products in the world. One objection that has been urged against the colonization of the Alaska seal in Hudson Bay is that it might destroy the fisheries of the waters of the bay, but even if this were so the seal could be exterminated in very short order if it proved a nuisance, or a detriment to a more profitable industry.

It would be easy enough to transplant the seals from Behring Sea to Hudson Bay, as they are easily caught and quick transportation could be arranged across the continent and into the Hudson Bay water.

Seal skins sold in London this season were only sufficient to make 12,000 jackets. In a few years, if Canada keeps on growing as she is there will be 100,000 Canadian women to buy seal skin saques annually, and if they put their case to him Sir Wilfred Laurier might earn a great deal of feminine gratitude by giving some attention to the establishment of Alaska seal rookeries in Canadian eastern sub-Arctic waters.

The feeling is rather one of pride that a genuine workman is called to the highest Council of the State, something that would be hard to realize in any other country.


"Yes sir," was the meek reply.
