### Clipping the Horse.

A horse is a valuable asset, and should be well fed, comfortably stabled carefully groomed and had better be clipped in the early spring. If he receives these attentions he will work well and improve in value. A horse lives under artificial conditions. In his wild state he required none of these attentions, for he was able to look out for himself. The domesticated animal, being worked under conditions that are in themselves artificial must be kept in condition for such work.

The clipping of a horse in the early spring is now admitted to be beneficial to health. Farmers in England and France have been clipping their horses for many years, and American farmers are not slow to realize its advantages. A clipped horse dries out rapidly after a hard day's work, and will rest comfortably and be refreshed for the work of the following day. An unclipped horse is liable to catch the heaves, pneumonia and all sorts of colds, rheumatism, etc. More especially is this so in the early spring when his hair is long and he is "soft." If worked hard he will perspire freely and the moisture will be held by his long hair, and the food that should go to nourish him will be used to replenish the heat that is being constantly taken from his body by the mass of cold wet hair. If clipped, the perspiration will evaporate almost as soon as secreted, and when put in the stable he rests comfortably and his food does him good.

Some years ago a Buffalo street car company tested the value of clipping in the following manner. They owned 500 horses, 250 of these were clipping early in the spring and 250 were not clipped. A careful record was kept of the result, and it was found that of the 250 unclipped horses 153 were afflicted with coughs and pneumonia, while of the 250 clipped not one case of sickness was reported.

A man would not expect to enjoy very good health if he did hard manual work clothed with very heavy underwear, a heavy suit and a fur overcoat, and after perspiring freely as he naturally would go to sleep without removing the same. It is just as ridiculous to expect a horse to be in perfect health if worked under the same conditions.

### Diplomatic Ever.

Story is told of the late John Hay illustrative of that fine diplomatic temperament that made his name known all over the world.

Some years ago Mr. Hay sent Mr. Alexander Gunn of Cleveland for his perusal the manuscript of an interesting bit of work by Mark Twain, entitled, "A Conversation as it was at the Social Fireside in the time of the Tudors." Mr. Hay knew that his friend Gunn, a connoisseur of literature and art, would be much interested in what the former termed a "serious effort to bring back our literature and philosophy to the chase, Elizabethan standard."

Now it appears that Mr. Gunn was so delighted with Twain's sketch that he wrote to Mr. Hay proposing to print a limited number of copies thereof for private distribution. It is said that Mr. Hay replied as follows:

"The proposition you make to pull a few proofs of Twain's masterpiece is highly attractive, and, of course, highly immoral. I cannot properly consent to the suggestion, as I am afraid the great man would think I was taking an unfair advantage of his confidence. Accordingly, I will thank you to send back the manuscript as soon as possible; but if, in spite of my prohibition, you take those proofs, save me one."

It were superfluous to add that, with this hint, the proofs were "pulled"—one for Mr. Hay and one for Mr. Gunn.

Bishop Heber was among the few men whose hymns passed into the heritage of Christendom during their lifetime. He once heard one of his compositions sung by his native converts in Meerut, more beautifully, he thought, than he ever had in England. And as he listened to the voices he had awakened, he felt a belief in his power for good which he had never before experienced.

Rev. G. R. Prynn felt some natural pleasure on one occasion when the incumbent of the Protestant church at Rome gave out his hymn "Jesus, Meek and Gentle," when he was helping in the service. He discovered afterward that the clergyman was entirely ignorant that he was the author; but even when shorn of complimentary significance, the incident left a sweet and lasting impression.

He had not realized till then that his hymn had made its way in the world outside England. Hearing it so far away from home, he said, seemed to widen his sphere of service.

A curate once ventured to hand a book to the late Bishop Wordsworth of Lincoln at a church opening, while his hymn, "O Day of Rest and Gladness," was being rendered. The bishop's gesture of refusal was fine and courtly.

"Do you suppose, young man, that I want a book for my own hymn?" he asked. "Or do you mean to say that you are not aware I wrote it?"

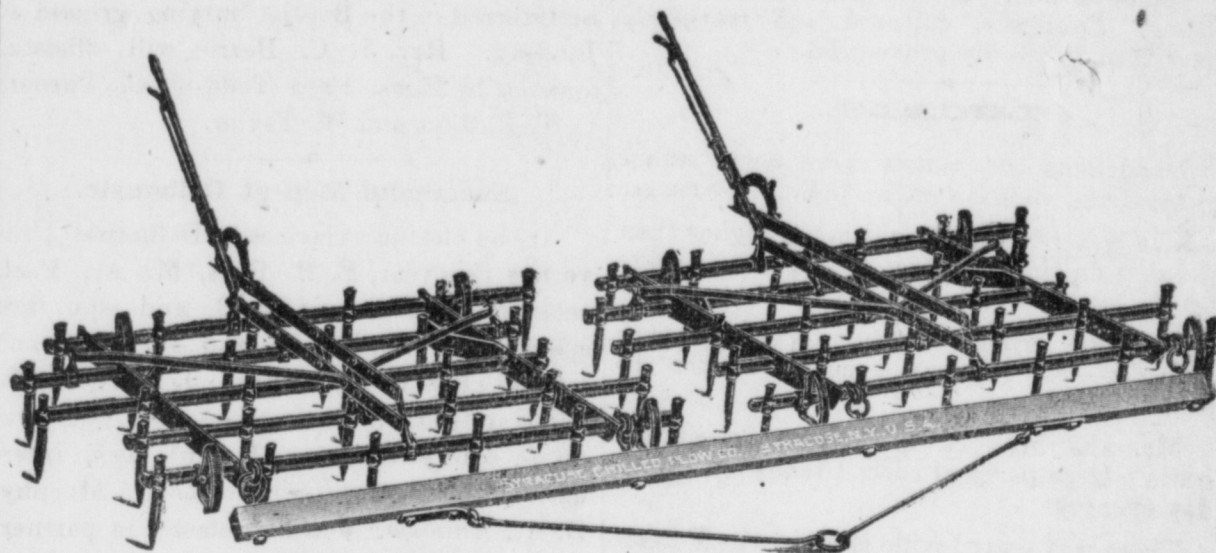
