The Settler, The School, and the Church.

Canadian immigration this year bids fair to be largely in excess of even the greatest expectations. The passenger agent of one of the great railway corporations of the United States, speaking at Chicago the other day of the exodus of farmers from Indiana, Illinois, Ohio, and Michigan into the Canadian Northwest, said that already this year the traffic is ahead of any previous season, and that not only a larger number but a superior class will cross the boundary at Portal and build homes in Saskatchewan and Alberta. From personal knowledge he testified that among those settlers there are no failures and no paupers. They are the most enterprising and progressive farmers in the four States named, and many of them begin life in Canada with from \$5,000 to \$100,000 of ready money. The labor conditions in the cities, where the rigid rules of the labor unions make it difficult for newcomers to find a footing, are not inviting to young men from the farm; and the high price of land makes it impossible for a farmer to establish his sons in a desirable agricultural neighborhood. The result is, according to this wellinformed and trustworty railway official, that many thousands of American farmers, some of them ex-Canadians, are transplanting themselves and their families to the Canadian

One of the managers of a great land company whose business it is to handle lands in the western States and in Alberta stated quite frankly that the social conditions on the Canadian side where the greatest attraction. "What surprises and pleases our best munities in your western Provinces they find good schools and large, well-filled, and strongly-named churches. I speak from first-hand knowledge when I say that merely as a piece of immigration policy it would pay your Canadian Government to aid in every possible way the Home Mission Committees of the churches in Canada that are establishing the institutions of civilization and religion in those new settlements. Where our land agents can show a free, self-sporting, well attended church the prospective settler decides that such a community is a good one in which to bring up his family."

This whole problem of the pioneer settlement and the incoming settler is full of opportunity and responsibility for all who have to do with building up Canadian nationhood. There are no better settlers than those who come from the finest agricultural States in the Union with British blood still in their veins or with appreciation of Canadian institutions strong in their minds, and the churches of Canada are doing great service in liberally supporting and strongly mannino the aggressive work of their mission ary organizations.

Discarding Chinese in B. C.

British Columbians do not say very much about their yellow peril. They take the Chinaman philosophically. He cooks and washes for them, he makes an increasing proportion of their clothes. In the salmon canneries he cleans, weighs and seals the fish. The wealthier part of him walks the streets in the dignity of white men's clothes and the

splendor of a silk elongated pigtail, which tickles his calves as he slips thru the crowd. In Vancouver City, for "three bits" you may see and hear him on the stage of his own theatre-a mournful experience which you must not miss and which yo do not want to repeat. All the time you wonder what will happen, anyway, and what might have happened if immigration were for him the easy thing it used to be. Occasionally you find yourself comparing what you see with what is printed about his brethren toiling under the British flag on the Rand, well manacled by indentures which are foreign to the spirit of the most exclusive legislation of this con-

Sign of a change has just come from the Island of Vancouver. Chinamen abound in and around Nanaimo. For several years the Chemainus Lumber Company has been using Chinamen, who work long and steadily for pay which white men will not accept, albeit the Celestial finds it better than the dreams of avarice in his own land. But the company has had enough of the yellow worker, who is being entirely replaced by white labor. In the long run, the speaker of pigeon-English is costlier and less productive than his more complaining competitor.

The excessive gregariousness of the Chinaman is against real development. Chemainus did not seem to grow. Ten or fifteen Chinamen living in one house meant stagnation to an otherwise promising neighborhood. So out the yellow fellows have had to go, a few at a time. Since the change began seven new house have been built at Chemainus. There's progress.

South Africa Relics.

The Dominion Government has received a limited number of Mauser rifles, trophies of the South African war, from the imperial government for distribution to centres in which an active part was taken in supplying men for the several contingents which left Canada during the war.

It is proposed to distribute them as follows: Military museums, military institutes, Dominion and provincial libraries, public libraries, militia units from which men were enrolled for South Africa, athletic associations, Y. M. C. A.'s historical societies.

Applications for rifles should be made through the officer commanding the military district. Issues will be made after the first day of May next.


