Denmark as a Free Trade Example.

In connection with this discussion of free trade and protection it may be well to state once again what Danish farmers have accomplished without the aid of any protection whatever in the home market, and in the face of world wide competition in the markets of Britain, in which the bulk of Denmark's surplus foodstuffs are sold.

It should be remembered, in considering the present position of Denmark, that the little kingdom suffered even more seriously than France from war during the latter half of the past century. In the war with Prussia and Austria she lost a territory embracing over one-third her then population. Since then she has reclaimed land previously unproductive equal in area to one-fourth that which was lost by war, and she has increased the population in the area reclaimed after the struggle until it almost equals that of the kingdom before dismemberment.

This, however, is only part of Danish achievements in the last half century. There has been an increase in exports of agricultural products from a little over £5,000,000 in 1875 to £16,000,000 in 1902. Even more remarkable than the increase in the volume of Danish agricultural exports is the quality of the same. In 1902 Danish butter and bacon sold in Britain at 10s per long cwt. above the average price obtained for like products sold by other countries in the same market. In eggs the showing was even more in favor of Denmark, Danish eggs selling at one shilling and nine pence more per ten dozen than was obtained on the average for eggs sold in the British market by other countries. On less than £15,000,000 worth of butter, bacon, and eggs sold by Denmark in Great Britain in 1902 the price realized was £1,700,000 in excess of the sum obtained for the like quantity of the same products sold by other countries in the British market. Under such circumstances it is not surprising to learn that Danish prosperity is steadily increasing, as evidenced by an increase in the deposits of savings banks—£4,000,000 in 1863 to £37,200,000 in 1901.

How have these marvelous results been achieved? They were not, as already said, accomplished by means of protection. Denmark's position today is wholly due to a system of agricultural co-operation and education which is without a parallel in the world.

Two Changes of Policy Which Have Come With a Change of Government.

N. Y. Post: In two matters of capital importance, the new Liberal Ministry has acted with great promptitude and vigor. In both, the policy of the Balfour Government has been sharply reversed. First, in India the subordination of the civil to the military power, for which Gen. Kitchener fought, and on account of which Lord Curzon resigned, is no longer to be tolerated. One would have expected as much from the new Secretary for India, John Morley. Bred in the old Liberal tradition, he is not the man to allow an aggressive general to bully a viceroys. The consequence is that it is now Gen. Lord Kitchener who talks of resigning. The other bold step taken by the Liberal Government is its abrupt overturn of the system of importing coolie labor into the Transvaal, on conditions practically amounting to slavery. The defence of it by the Governor, Lord Selborne, is its sufficient condemnation. He shows that 45,000 Chinese have been brought in to work the mines; that they are under a three years' contract which binds them hand and foot. They are kept in compounds from which not one is allowed to stir except with a pass. For infractions of the rules, they are liable to flogging.

The premium that is put on roguery by our social and business system is the ruin of many a man and business. The man who would be free indeed is the man who avoids debts as he would a pest house. 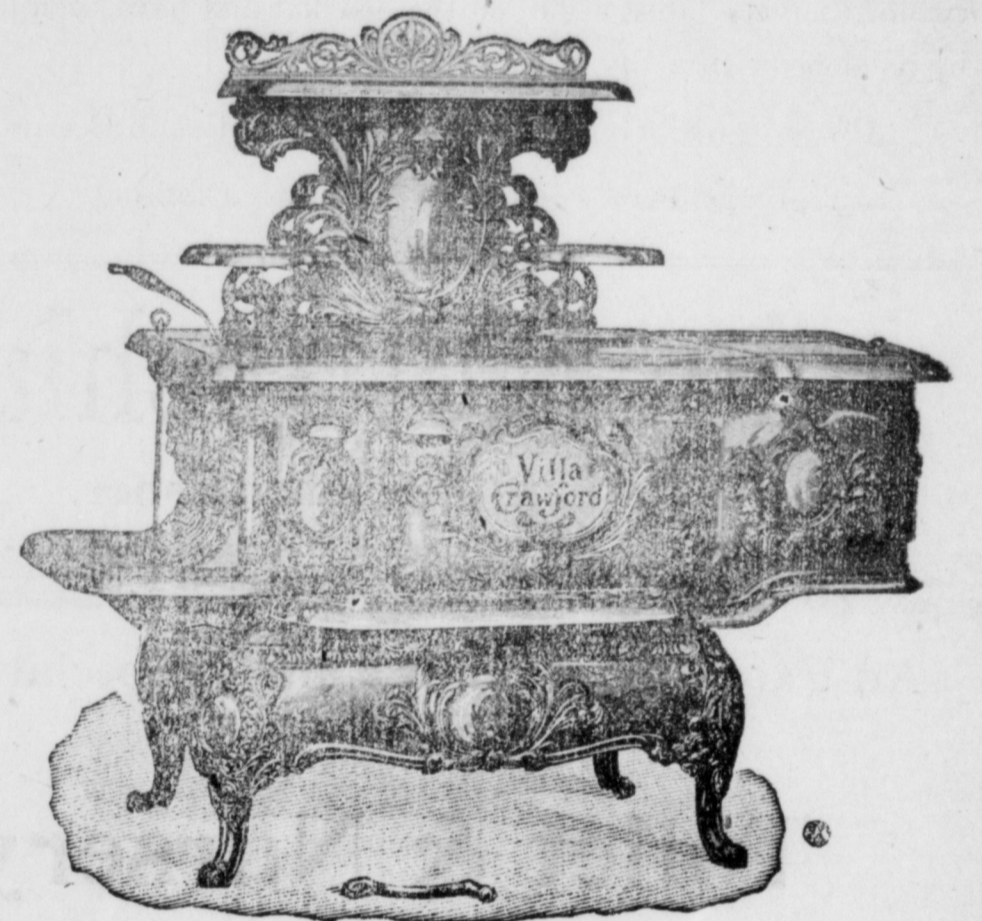
