#### Broiled Steak.

Trim off the superfluous fat and the flank end of a sirloin steak. Grease the gridiron with some of the fat, and hold over the coals, has been visiting Dr. Schriver in Bridgewater | turning every ten seconds, until both sides of the meat are seared; then turn less often. Cook about four minutes if liked rare, or a minute or two longer if liked well doue. Serve on a warm platter with butter, salt

#### Warm Gingerbread.

Put one cup of sugar, one cup of molasses, one cup of butter and one cup of sour milk into a bowl. Add three well-beaten eggs and four and one-half cups of flour sifted, with a level tablespoon of ginger, a level teaspoon of soda and a teaspoon of cinnamon. Beat well and bake in a shallow pan. Serve wara, by cutting through the crust with a sharp knife and breaking the pieces apart.

#### Lemon Cake.

Beat one cup of butter to a cream, add two cups of powdered sugar, one half cup of milk, the well beaten yolks of four eggs, three cups of flour sifted with four level teaspoons of baking powder, and last the whites of four eggs beaten stiff. Bake in layer cake tins and spread with a lemon filling.

Corn Starch Pudding.

Heat four cups of milk, add three rounding tablespoons of cornstarch made smooth in a little cold milk, five rounding table spoons of sugar and a saltspoon of salt. Cook five minutes, add four well beaten eggs, a teaspcon of butter, aud bake in a buttered pudding dish. Serve cold with cream.
