Sectionmen will receive from \$1.40 to \$1.55 a day, and track foremen from \$1.90 to \$3.10, and bridge foremen from \$2.60 to \$2.75.

MR. C. E. PHILLIPS of Cedar Cove, Vancouver, B. C., who has been in the west six or eight years is visiting his old home at Coldstream. Mr. Phillips says that when Ben.
