The losses of one of the foreign fire insurance companies in the San Francisco diaster recalls the fact that this company was originally projected by Daniel Defoe, author of Robinson Crusoe, at the time when he was pamphleteering for the union of Scotland with England. Defoe's fire insurance project was left in abeyance while he turned his energies to the Bank of Scotland. In the first stage of the South Sea speculation this fire insurance company was organized, chiefly for providing parishes with fire engines and paid for by assessments on rate payers. This was the first paid fire department in the world. This old corporation and one other, also hard hit in San Francisco, are the only survivors of the 7,000 projects floated in England in the South Sea era of speculatiue

Abdul The Damned.

The Sultan has partly, and will probably wholly, surrender to the demands of Great Britain that he clear out from what Britain alleges to be Egyptain territory and that the question then be settled by arbitration. The British demand has been put in such a form as involes a final surrender by the Porte of any claim upon Egypt. Considerable credence is given in intelligent quarters to the story that the Sultan is a doomed man and cannot live many months. He is said to be intemperate. If that means alcoholism it is a curious charge against a Mohammedan padishah. The prospects of his death raises surmises as to what may follow. If he has not been a scrupulous, Abdul Hamid has been a strong and astute ruler. Neither his brother the legitimate heir to the throne according to Mohammedan law, nor his eldest son, whom he is said to desire as his successor, has given indications of having the strength of character and genius in statecraft which have enabled him by playing the discordant elements within and without his realm against each other to preserve from destruction a rotten system which has only enemies within it and outside of it, and which is a sad anachronism in the world of to-day. Undistracted by illusions concerning the facts of his situation, unmanner of dealing with them, Abdul Hamid has had wonderful success in carrying out a policy which has earned for him such blistering appelations as 'Abdul the Damned,' and The Great Assassin.' When a man is fighting for his crown and his life, he if hable to grasp any weapon he can. Viewed from any point, a satisfactory solutoin of the Turkish probem seems impossible. Abdul Hamid has only succeded in postponing the inevitable disruption and wil leave his successor a most unenviable throne.-The Witness.

Intellectual Drinks.

Flying-Fish.

Flying-Fish must have been watched ever since the first mariners ventured upon the sea, and yet the question of the manner in which they perform their flights is apparently unsettled. Doctor Abel of the Austrian Geological Survey, in a recent memoir on these fishes, maintains that the initial impetus by means of which they launch themselves is due to screw-like movements of the tail fin, and that the wings are in no sense propelling organs, but act simply as parachutes. On the other hand, it is maintained by other observers that the flight of flyingfishes is due to incessant and extremely rapid movements of their wing-like fins. It has been suggested that there may be different species of fish, and that consequently there may be truth in both views.


