An Old Picture of St. John.

Joshua Corkery has just become the owner of a pretty old lithograph and one that must be rather rare in the province today. According to the inscription on it, it is a "View of the great conflagration that took place in St. John on the night of Saturday the 14th day of January 1837. The fire commenced on Peters' wharf about 9 o'clock in the evening, by which at least one-third of the commercial part of the City of St. John became a heap of smouldering ashes. The total amount of loss sustained was estimated at \$250,000." All the buildings on King street clear down to Market Square were apparently dwelling houses and all the goods represented as being saved from burning buildings in the square are household goods.
