Bath.

The freshet has taken away part of the Whitfield Giberson mill dam and completely destroyed the mill building. The greater part of the mill machinery was removed in time. The loss is a heavy one. Mr. Giberson is confined to his bed with a serious sickness. This mill was built by Bohan Bros. about fifteen years ago and in connection with the rotary and planing machinery, Bohan Bros. operated a complete wood working factory for a number of years. The loss of this mill at this time of year is a great inconvenience to the community.

The drive on the Monquart is coming along nicely and there is now every expectation that all the past winter's cut of logs as well as all the old lumber will be bought out this season. B. F. Smith, M. P. P., is the party chiefly interested in this lumber and has been at the head of the stream looking after the driving for the last past week.

Good reports are received from the Miramichi lumber drivers, that they are making good progress and that matters as far as the season permits could not look better for them. The water in the river at this point is rising fast and at the present writing is above any point reached last year at any time.

Two New Brunswickers Killed.

Four rivers drivers were instantly killed and their bodies horribly mangled by the explosion of a large quantity of dynamite which they were thawing out over a fire on Tuesday May 1st at a point on the Aroostook river near Ox Bow. The dead men are:

Hugh Gillen, of Mars Hill, 22 years old, single. Fred Grass, of Little Lake, Sunbury county, New Brunswick, 42 years old, leaves a wife and six children. Emery McGuire, of Linneus, 28 years old, leaves a family. Burdy Golding, 17 years old, of Little Lake, N. B., single.

The dead men were part of a crew of twenty-six employed by the Ashland Company and were the only ones in the immediate vicinity of the fire. The explosion was terrific, the bodies being hurled in every direction and a large hole torn in the ground.

Swine Raising.
