Dyed Food.

If we are to be perfectly fair and consistent in dealing with the pure food business it seems that we should be careful about fixing all blame where it belongs. Perhaps tomato catsups and preserved strawberries have been colored to a point deeper than any which nature ever attempted. But whose fault? Who demanded that these preserved things should please the eye first? Women know, at least they all ought to know, that when these things are prepared in their own kitchens strawberries lose their fine colour. Tomato catsup, too, home brewed, has not the vivid scarlet that a ripe tomato usually has. Still the housekeeper knows the articles are pure and good to eat, for they were prepared by her orders. Yet this very same woman—she is helping to fight the good fight for pure food, too, you may be sure—when she visits her grocer turns from the preserved strawberries if they are not red and refuses to order tomato catsup that has no bloom. She does not ask how these colors were retained by the cocked fruits. Or she never has, in the past. And so may she not fairly be charged with complicity in the coloring scheme against which she now helps to make a merry war?—Boston Transcript.

The Oldest Tree in the World.

The dragon tree of the Canary Islands is notable for the existence of individuals believed to be the oldest living vegetable organism in the world. The age of one tree, in particular, the once famous dragon tree of Teneriffe, has usually been estimated to be from four thousand to six thousand years, having thus an antiquity comparable with that of the Pyramids. This wonder of the plant world was seventy feet or more in height, and survived intact until the year 1819, when during a terrific storm one of the large branches was broken off. A similar storm in 1867 stripped the trunk of its remaining branches and left it standing alone. This tree derives its common name from a reddish exudation known as dragon's blood, found in the sepulchral caves of the Canaries, and supposed to have been used by them in embalming their dead. It is said to have been at one time an important article of export from the Canaries, and has never fallen entirely into disuse.

Canadians at Yale.

Acadia, N. S., College stands fourth among the colleges of the continent in the number of students sent to Yale University. Six students from Acadia entered Yale in the fall of 1903, they all took their degrees in the following June, and made such a brilliant showing that they won from the American students many prizes and scholarships. Four of the men who tried for scholarships and fellowship won about \$2,500 during that year, making a phenomenal record, and three of the six are now members of Yale faculty. All told twenty-five Canadian students are enrolled at Yale this year.

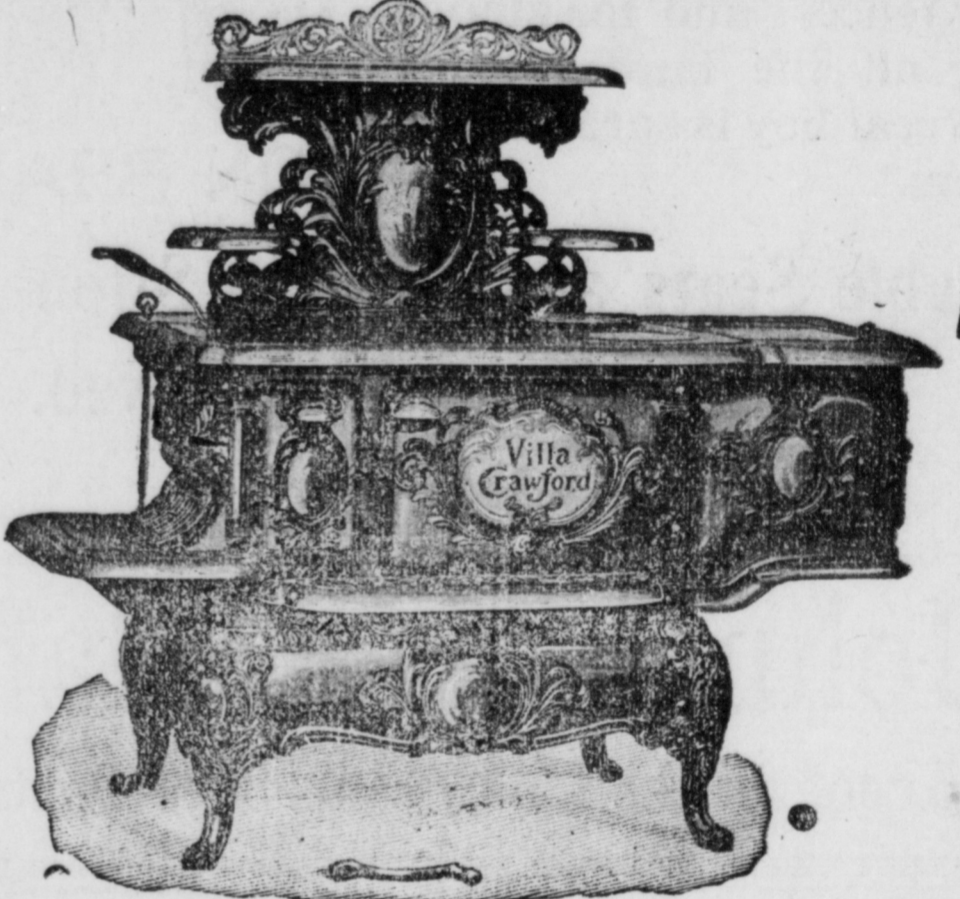

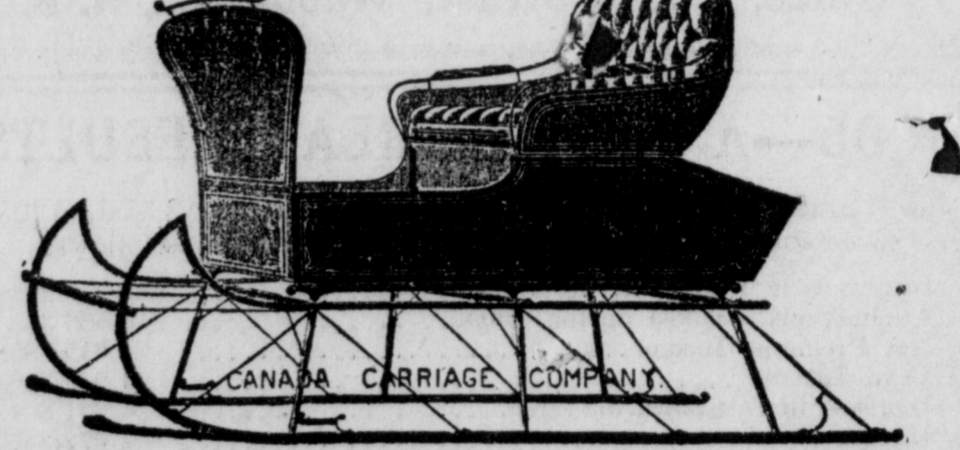
