Some Costly Dresses.

Fads in dress come high. Worth once confessed that a Peruvian heiress paid him \$24,000 for a single gown. The bill for the coronation train of the Empress of Russia was \$45,000. If a gown is made of lace, the bill may be anything the purchaser wishes to pay. Probably the Worth gown already mentioned was made of this material, and this would account for its price. As an example of lace prices, it may be mentioned that the lace handkerchiefs made in St. Gall, Switzerland, are charged for at the rate of \$11 apiece, and these are, of course, modern make. Lace is like wine, in that its value increases with age. The Queen Dowager of Italy is said to be the possessor of a lace handkerchief two hundred years old and valued at \$10,000. "Point Treese" lace, which was made of flax mixed with human hair, is also immensely valuable. A French collector owns a tiny square made from the gray hair of Margaret Countess of Lennox, the mother of the unhappy Lord Darnley. This is valued at \$6,000. But it is in the garments of unique materials that the faddist in dress has full sway. Of this type is the beetle wing dress, which made a fortune for its lucky owner, and is still worth a fortune today. Mrs. Sam Edwards, the wife of the clever actor, is the possessor of this wonderful garment, which was sent to her as a wedding present by an Indian Rajah in recognition of services done him by her husband. Fifteen thousand wing cases of an Indian beetle are sewed upon the material and lend a green shimmering radiance to its folds.

An Allens Act Romance.

That the new Aliens Act is not being very strenuously applied in England is shown by the story of Noah Basonak and a Polish maiden. Out of seventy Russians, Poles and Jews seeking admittance one day, five were refused permission to make a home in England. Among these were the Russian named Noah Basonak, who was at first turned away because of lack of means. When he was so informed, however, he told a graphic story which provided ample grounds for his admittance as a political refugee. He had served in the Russian army as an infantryman, and during the disturbances in Zarnigoff was ordered to fire upon a crowd of compatriots, who were holding a meeting in the public square. Refusing to obey the order, he was brutally assaulted by his captain for disobedience, whom he in turn shot through the head. He was arrested and put in prison, but was allowed to escape during the night by a sympathetic guard of his regiment. After many hardships and narrow escapes from capture, he managed to get to Germany, and thence to England. He was a tailor and had friends at Leeds, whither he was bound. If he had told a similar, or even a more pathetic, story to the immigration officers at New York, he would have been deported just the same to the place whence he came; but the English officers sent him happy to his destination. More astonishing still was the case of the Polish maiden who was refused by the officers because she had no money. Blushingly she urged, "I must not go back. I'm going to be married!" Upon further inquiry, the maiden coyly told the officers that she had met Basonak during his flight, and had agreed to share one another's joys and sorrows for life. The officers were touched. They determined not to separate two loving hearts, and so Basonak and his lady love were allowed to land together and go on their way rejoicing. Used as we have become on this side to the most rigid and intolerant carrying out of a harsh immigration law, such tender-hearted consideration on the part of the English immigration officers excites our delighted amazement. A department that is so evidently being carried out on humanitarian principles can surely never do anything very dreadful to poor alien folks seeking asylum.—Witness.

A household economics authority says: "In caring for linoleum do not use soap suds as for scrubbing a floor. It stands to reason that soap is going to injure the varnish and the finish. On a farm where there is plenty of milk, a cloth wrung out of skim milk is the best means of taking up the dust and brightening the linoleum. Where milk is scarce, or needed for food, use lukewarm water, to which has been added half a cupful of kerosene oil or some good furniture polish. Wring the cloth rather dry for this, and go over the linoleum after sweeping, and it will be quite new and bright, and the finish uninjured. . . . Most housewives scrub oil-cloth and linoleum as though it were a bare floor; it is dusty rather than dirty, since everything remains on the top, and for this reason a clean cloth slightly damp is all that is necessary."

Alcohol in Patent Medicine.

It is announced from Ottawa that the Inland Revenue Department will shortly publish the results of analyses that its chemists have made of some of the best-known patent medicines on sale in Canada.

The Dominion Government is deserving of commendation for the action it is taking. It has been charged by newspapers across the line—particularly by Collier's Weekly—that some patent medicines contain a great deal more alcohol than is found in beer and wine, and are, indeed, in this respect on about the same level as whiskey. This is too serious a matter to be disregarded, and the prosecution of an inquiry along this line should not, in this country, be left to the newspaper press. The Government is, therefore, we repeat, to be commended for what it is doing, and its action should be followed by legislation rendering it obligatory upon vendors of patent medicines to show on the label just what percentage of alcohol, or other possibly harmful ingredients, their preparations contain.
