Denmark's King Died Monday.
COPENHAGEN, Denmark, Jan. 29.—The King of Denmark is dead. He died at nine o'clock Monday morning.

King Christian IX. was born April 8th, 1818, and was therefore nearly 88 years of age. He was the fourth son of the late Duke Wilhelm of Schleswig-Holstein. He was appointed to the succession of the crown of Denmark by the treaty of London, May 8th, 1852, and by the Danish law on July 31st, 1853. He succeeded to the throne on November 15th, 1863, and has therefore reigned 43 years. In 1842 he married Louise, the daughter of Landgrave Wilhelm of Hesse Cassel, who died Sept. 29, 1893. Their children are Prince Frederick, who now becomes king; Her Majesty Queen Alexandra, wife of King Edward VII.; Prince Wilhelm, now King George of Greece; the Empress Maria, wife of the late Czar of Russia; Princess Thyre, wife of the Duke of Cumberland, and Prince Waldemar.
