Fruit and Nut Rolls.

Sift together three times, three cups of flour, six level teaspoonfuls of baking powder and half a teaspoonful of salt. Work in from one-third to one-half a cup of shortening. Then mix to a dough with milk. Turn onto a floured board, knead slightly and then roll into a square sheet about one-third of an inch thick. Brush over the sheet of dough with softened butter, then sprinkle with sultana raisins or cleaned currants, and filberts cut into several pieces. Roll up the dough compactly, and then cut the roll into pieces an inch long. Set these on end close together in a buttered baking dish, and bake about twenty minutes.

"Out of the Mouths of Babies."

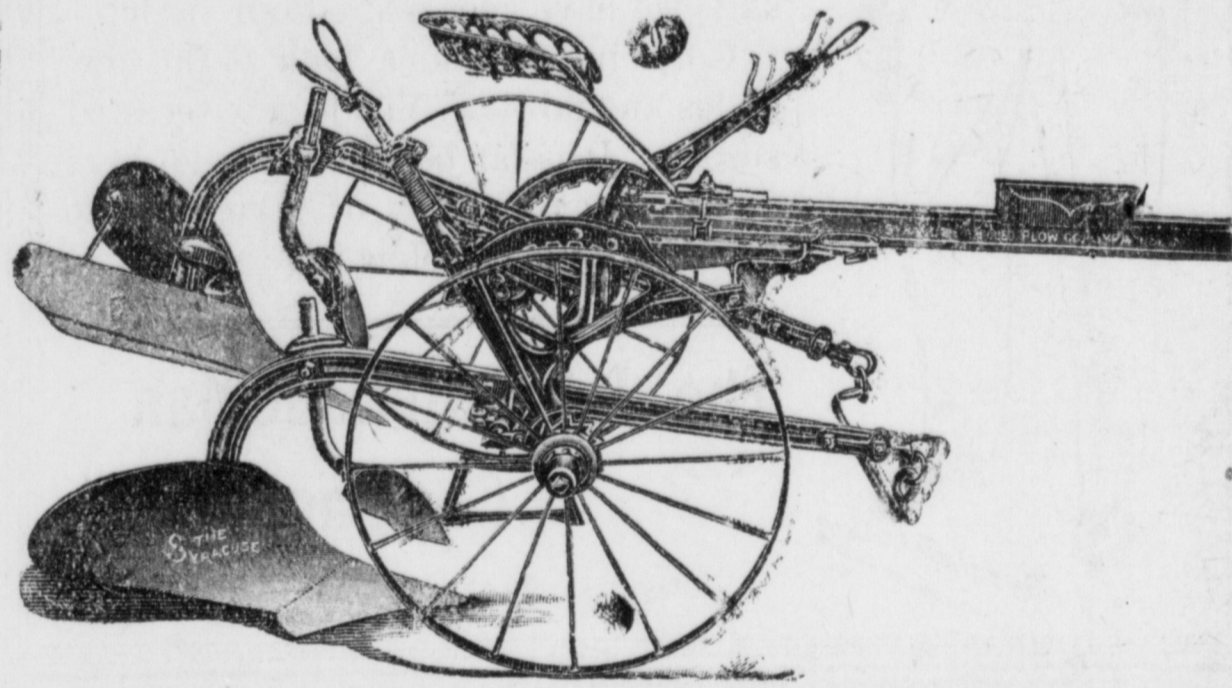
When the May and the June baby had got well acquainted, they exchanged confidences.

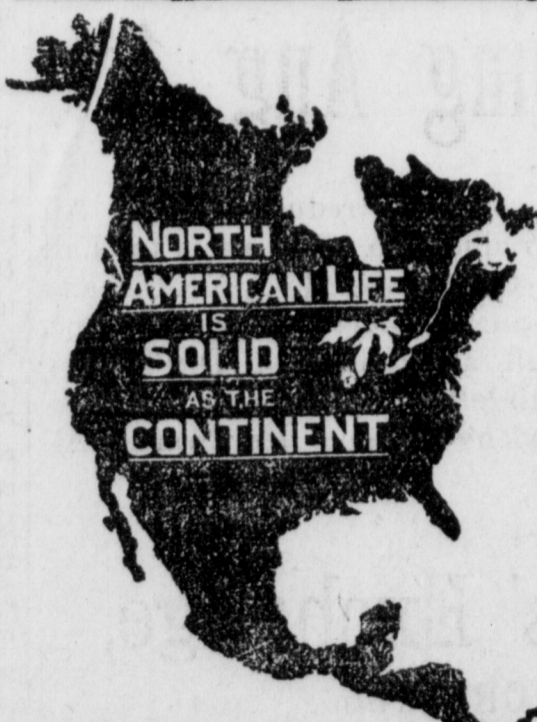
