tirely the opportunities for intellectual devel-

elsewhere, and a humble cottage in the
Kingdom can be made to shine with a bright-
ness above palace walls. For my part I
would rather have been Charles Lamb than
the Duke of Wellington, and his influence in
the world is incalculably the greater of the
two. And yet he was but a clerk in the
India House, poor in pocket, but rich beyond
measure in his very poverty, whose jewels
are not in the goldsmith's list. The problem
of life is to rightly adjust the prose to the
poetry; the sordid to the spiritual; the com-
mon and selfish to the high and beneficent,
forgetting not that these last are incomparably
the more precious.

Modern life is a startling contradiction.
Never were colleges so numerous, so prosper-
ous, so richly endowed as now. Never were
public schools as well conducted, or so largely
patronized. But yet, what Carlyle perhaps
too bitterly calls "the mechanical spirit of
the age" is upon us. The commercial spirit,
too, is with us, holding its head so high that
timid souls are frightened at its pretensions.
It is the scholars duty to set his face resolute-

Intestinal Indigestion.

It was formerly thought that the stomach
was the main organ of digestion, and dyspep-
sia was supposed always to have its seat there.
But this question has been much studied of
late, with the result that the stomach has
been found to be of little account, compar-
atively, in the preparation of the food for
absorption. The most important part of
digestion occurs in the upper part of the
intestines, where the food, after leaving the
stomach, is churned and mixed thoroughly
with the bile and pancreatic secretion.

Since, then, the intestine takes such an im-
portant part in digestion, it is natural to
suppose that a failure to perform this function
properly would give rise to serious distur-
bance of health, and such, in fact, is the case.

Intestinal indigestion is a not uncommon
affection at all periods of life, and is espe-
cially prevalent in children. The chief symptoms
are flatulence, or wind, more or less colic,
diarrhoea, or more often constipation, or an
alternation of the two; and practical starva-
tion, as shown in weakness and emaciation.

The treatment is mainly through diet, but
this will vary, of course, according to age.
In an infant the problem is a difficult one. If
the child is fed artificially, all prepared foods
containing starch should be taken away, and
cows' milk, modified as to the amount of fat,

sugar or casein it contains, according to the
physician's directions, should be substituted.

If the infant is nursing, the life of the
mother should be studied, for the state of
her health may affect the milk injuriously.

In older children and adults the amount of
fats and of starchy foods must be carefully
regulated. Cereals, pastry, rice, potatoes
and bread must be cut out of the dietary for
a time, or taken in very small quantity.
When eaten at all they should be most
thoroughly, even excessively, chewed, for in
this way they may be in great measure digested
by the saliva before reaching the intestine.

The diet should consist mainly of milk,
white of eggs, and the more easily digestible
meats and fish. The diarrhoea or constipation
should be regulated, and sometimes the ad-
ministration of intestinal antiseptics is bene-
ficial. Regular exercise in the open air is of
great value in the treatment. The cold bath
or shower-bath is often of service, when it is
followed by a healthy reaction.

a pitchfork with telling effect on the dog.

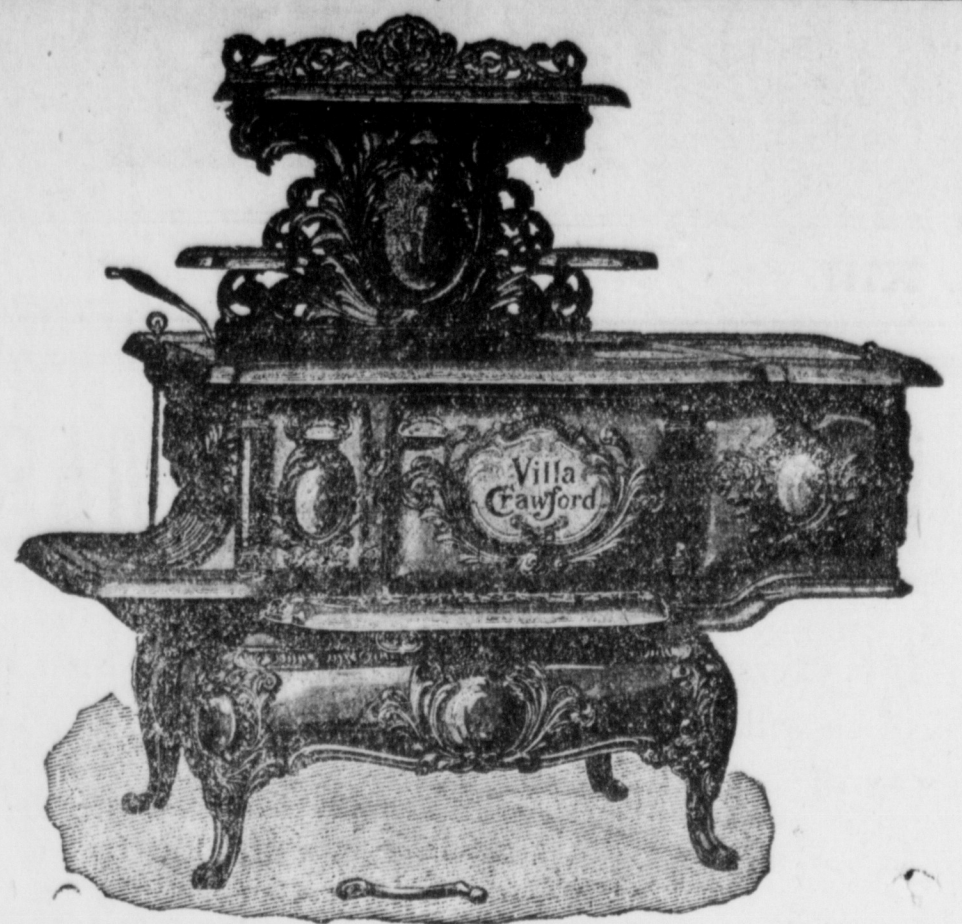
Later he was called on by the deacon, who
