When Surgeons and Barbers Joined Hands.

More than 400 years old is the Royal College of Surgeons, Edinburgh. At the time it was founded the surgeons and barbers of the city were united as one of the fourteen incorporated trades of Edinburgh. On July 1, 1505, they received their charter from the Town Council. The charter of the barbersurgeons was confirmed by James IV., an early Stuart King, of great enlightenment and accomplishment, who took much interest in the progress of the surgeons on account of the needs of his army in time of war.

In the charter leave was given to the incorporation to control the medical education of the city, such as it was in these days; of blood letting, to have the sole right of practice and to put down quacks.

They were to get every year the body of a criminal who had been executed to practice anatomy on, and they promised in return to do "suffrage for his soul." ()f the first 158 members of the incorporation, six were surgeons to the Kings of Scotland.

As society improved and medical science developed, the gulf between the surgeons and barbers widened, and in 1772, as the result of a process in the Court of Session, the connection was finally terminated. The deacon or president of the incorporation of surgeons was for more than 320 years a member of the Town Council of Edinburgh, ex-officio, and several of the deacons were members of the Scottish Parliament.


