Carleton County Rifle Association.

The annual business meeting of the Carleton County Rifle Association was held on the range at Woodstock on Monday of this week. Three clubs were represented at the meeting viz:—Mt. Pleasant, Avondale and Woodstock. The election of officers for the ensuing year resulted as follows: Capt. E. S. Kirkpatrick, Pres.; Allen Barter, 1st Lieut.; S. W. Smith, Sec.; and Capt. Harry Carvell, Treas. The annual County match will be shot this year at Mt. Pleasant on Monday, August 6th commencing at 8 30 A. M. sharp. The same rules adopted for the match last year will apply at the coming match. Local clubs entering teams for the team cup will be required to pay \$5.00 for entrance and clubs having a Gov. range \$7.50. Only clubs paying this entrance fee will have any voice in the management of the Association. The entrance fee from each individual will be \$1.00 from members of clubs paying the team fee; \$1.25 from members of other County clubs and \$1.50 from competitors who are not members in good standing of any County club. It is expected that there will be a large number of entries and this match promises to be the best ever held in the County. The Mt. Pleasant range is an excellent one. There will be two double sets of targets and telephone line on the range to the butts.
