### Alcohol in Bread.

There has been much discussion about the quantity of alcohol contained in ordinary bread as a result of the fermentative process to which it is subjected before baking. Evidently the quantity is small, but until recently, it would appear, chemists have not succeeded in accurately measuring it. Now,

however, it is announced that Dr. O. Pohl, by an elaborate process based upon the distillation of the bread to be tested in a Papin digester, has ascertained that ordinary bread normally contains .0753 of a grain of alcohol for every 100 grains of bread, or a little more than 7 parts in 10,000. It is well to be precise even in small things.

### How to Boil Potatoes.

An exchange says that potatoes should always be boiled with their jackets on, no matter for what use. Peeling is wasteful. When the skin is taken off the water soaks through and makes them soggy. They should be put in cold water and brought to a boil slowly. A handful of salt should be put into the pot. It raises the boiling point, so that quick cooking is assured, and also adds flavor. The right way to find out if a potato is thoroughly cooked is to test it with a metal fork or knitting needle.

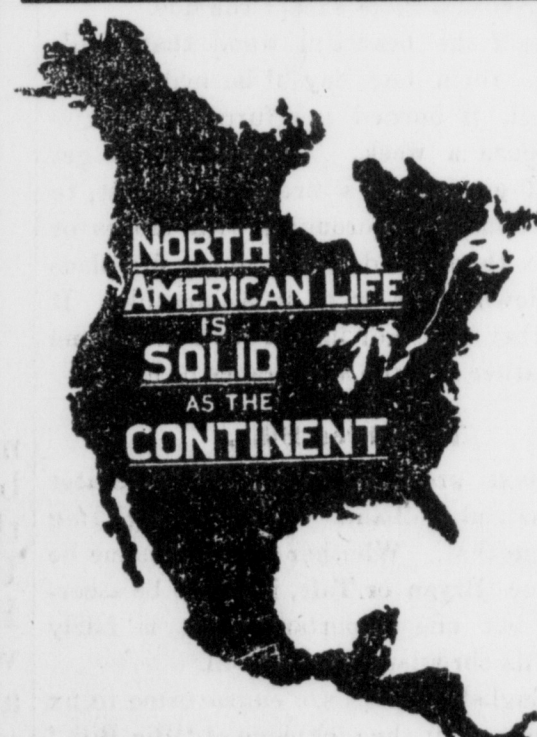
