## A New Government For Finland.

The Tsar was so impressed last year by the strength of the movement in Finland against the arbitrary Russianization of that grand duchy, and by the refusal of the people to respond to the summons to military service, that he promised the Finns a new constitution. The Finnish Diet, after sitting for nine months as a constituent assembly to frame the new form of government, has completed its work. The most striking innovation is that the ancient four-chambered Diet, with its four estates,—the nobles, the clergy, the burghers and the peasants,—which dates back to 1772, gives place to a parliament with a single chamber, the members of which are to be elected by universal male and female suffrage.

## The Hon. W. S. Fielding Wins.

With all the returns in from the Shelburne-Queens election Hon. W. S. Fielding has a majority of 1,016 over R. C. Weldon, compared with 385 which he had in the general election of 1904, when Mr. Fielding's opponent was J. J. Ritchie.

The Conservatives did not expect so great a majority against them as this, but there was not a worker in the united counties on the opposition side, during the campaign, who did not know, though he would not publicly admit it, that the minister of finance would secure his election.

The only hope of Dr. Weldon's friends was that they might keep the majority of the minister of finance somewhat near his figures for 1904. Mr. Fielding has 262 more votes than he secured in that contest and Dr. Weldon has 344 less votes than Ritchie received.

## No Wonder he was Helpless.

It is not necessary that a lawyer should be eloquent to win verdicts, but he must have the tact which turns an apparent defeat to his own advantage. One of the most successful of verdict winners was Sir James Scarlett. His skill in turning a failure into a success was wonderful. She was a witness in behalf of her daughter, and completely baffled Scarlett, who cross-examined her.
