Keeping Squashes.
Winter varieties of squash should be taken from the field when fully ripe, but before the slightest frost has touched them. Select a dry day, and use every possible care not to bruise them or to break off the stems, as the slightest bruise will cause rot. Some extensive growers on Long Island have buildings expressly for them; the temperature in which they are kept is near fifty degrees as possible. Racks about four feet in width are put next to the sides of the building, and eight feet in width through the centre of the building. The bottoms of the racks are of narrow boards, which are left about an inch apart, to admit free circulation of air between the squashes. The racks are sufficiently far apart for a single layer, as when piled one upon another they will be very apt to rot. Give as little light as possible, and free ventilation overhead to carry off all moisture.—[Country Gentleman.

The Terrible Death Roll of Russia.
(New York 'Evening post.')
Some of the Russian newspapers observed on November 1 the anniversary of the granting to Russia of the so-called Constitution by footing up for the year the terrible roll of deaths by violence. Incomplete the figures must be, since only a portion of the actual facts found their way to the newspapers; yet the total of 24,339 deaths in riots or at the hands of the executioner, is enough to make the world stand aghast. No less than 22,721 persons are known to have perished in pogroms, riots, conflicts with the authorities, punitive expeditions. That this is only a part of the bloody record appears from the fact that hundreds, if not thousands, of the massacred Jews were never accounted for. Official executions disposed of 1,518 human lives, and thus proved beyond dispute how useless is capital punishment as a deterrent, when a whole nation is aroused. Of the political agitators, 851 were given penal sentences, aggregating 7,138 years. In the effort to control public opinion, 523 newspapers and reviews were suppressed, and 647 editors prosecuted. During the year, 31 provinces were wholly, and 46 partially, under exceptional laws (State of siege or war, etc.). To these figures the 'Strana' adds that during the past twelve months there were 1,629 agrarian riots, while 183 secret printing offices and 150 depots of arms were discovered, containing thousands of rifles and revolvers, tons of powder and explosives, and several machine guns. Bombs to the number of 244 were thrown at officials, while no less than 1,955 armed burglaries were reported.

HER LOVE FOR MOTHER.
The following story of Admiral Dewey is told by one of the sailors who returned on the Raleigh: Just before the battle of Manila, when the order was given to strip for action, the smallest powder boy on the flagship dropped his coat overboard. He asked permission to jump after it, but was refused. He went to the side of the ship, dropped overboard, recovered his coat, and was promptly arrested for disobedience. Admiral Dewey spoke kindly to the youngster, who broke down and said that the coat contained his mother's picture, which he had just kissed, and he could not bear to see it lost. Dewey's eyes filled with tears; he fairly embraced the boy and ordered him released, saying, "Boys who love their mothers enough to risk their lives for her picture cannot be kept in irons on this fleet."—Philadelphia Record.

Whey: One quart of fresh milk, two teaspoonfuls of sugar, a pinch of salt, four teaspoonfuls of essence of pepsin or liquid rennet. When the milk is just lukewarm add the other ingredients, stir for a minute, then allow it to stand for about twenty minutes; break up the clot with a fork and strain the whey through muslin; if ordered, a little stimulant may be added to this.

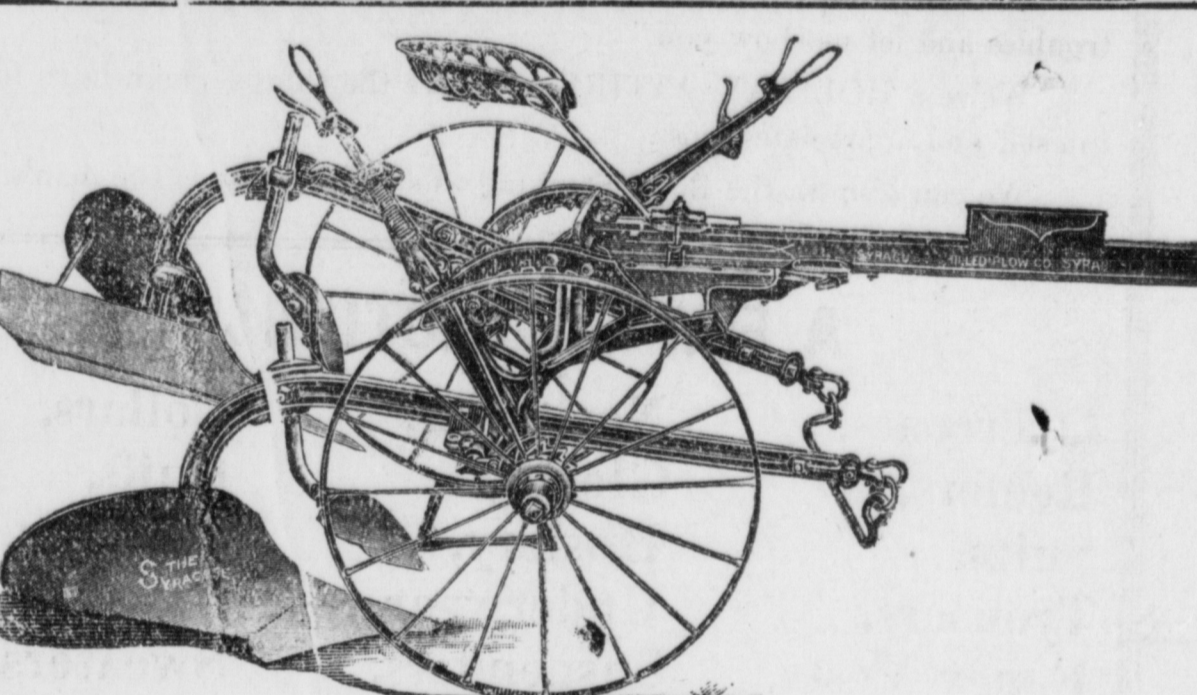
