How John Burns Drove a Tram Car.

In a speech at the municipal electric power station at Brighton on June 16, Mr. John Burns, the president of the Local Government Board, said: "May I give you a little biographical incident? Very few of you know that I was the first engineer to make with my own hands the first electrical tram-car in this country. That was in 1881, and we had the croskers then almost as bad as we have them now. Electrical tramway traction was then such a novelty that I had to take my governor's dynamo and electric tram experiment down to the Crystal Palace, and run it round the grounds for six months before we could induce people to believe that electric traction was possible, even as a toy experiment. That was in 1880-81, and so nervous were people at the thought of having to ride on these teams that we could not induce anyone to get into them.

"However, not being easily overcome by temporary difficulties, I told my sweetheart, now my wife, that she would have to go down to the Crystal Palace three times a week, and get into the first electrical car to act as 'decoy duck.' That was only temporarily successful, so I had to bring along my mother-in-law, and when husband, wife and mother-in-law, do co-operate in a matter of heat and traction success is inevitable."

Mysterious Disappearances.

In his book entitled "The Mysteries of Modern London" Mr. Geo. R. Sims deals in a fascinating manner with the question of mysterious disappearance. He says:—The desire to disappear, to drop a life that has its embarrassments, its unpleasantnesses, its limitations, may come to many of us, but there are generally circumstances which make the accomplishment of the desire exceedingly difficult. We are chained by a set of circumstances from which it is impossible to free ourselves without incurring consequences which may be disastrous, not only to ourselves, but to those we leave in ignorance of our fate.

After calamities in which there has been great loss of life and difficulty in identifying some of the victims, there are always a certain number of people who avail themselves of the opportunity of having their fate conjectured and never return to their homes.

So it comes about that husbands and wives are mourned as dead, their names, it may be, recorded upon the memorial stone above the family tomb, who are still in the land of the living. Under other name, far from the chance of recognition, they are living new lives with new family ties to replace the old ones they suddenly severed.

That is the mystery of the dead alive, a fascinating subject upon which many a romance has been written. To this day there are people who believe the astounding story told by men who affirmed that they had met Fauntleroy in America after his execution, and it was for a long time the custom to explain that this marvel had happened through the unfortunate banker being hanged with a silver tube in his throat.

On the popular belief that John Sadleir, member of Sligo, a junior Lord of the Treasury, Chairman of the London Joint Stock Banking Company, and the most successful

swindler of modern times, obtained the body of a man resembling himself, conveyed it to Hampstead Heath and placed his own silver cream jug with the remains of poison in it beside the corpse, Miss Braddon founded one of her famous novels.

The fact that gave rise to the doubt as to Sadleir's being really dead was this:—The body of the supposed Sadleir was found on Hampstead Heath some distance from the roadway or path. It had been a rainy evening, and the health was sodden. But the soles of the boots the dead man was wearing were clean and unstained with moisture.

Sadler did not leave his house till nearly midnight, long after the heavy rain had commenced. How did he cross the heath and lie down to poison himself and die without wetting the soles of his boots?

This strange circumstance was recalled when, long after the witnesses before the Coroner's jury had identified the body as that of Sadler, three men who had known him well declared that they had met him on the other side of the Atlantic.

In these instances of the dead alive there is only vague surmise to grasp at. The element of a grim certainty enters into the cases of those who drop out of life to meet an unascertained fate.

A friend of mine—an artist with whom in bygone years it was my privilege to be associated—had a daughter, a charming and beautiful girl of eighteen. She had no love affair or trouble of any kind. One winter evening about 7 o'clock her mother wanted some Berlin wool. Close by the house was a shopping street where the wool could be obtained. The girl offered to fetch it for her mother, and went out with a shilling or two in her pocket.

She bought the wool, but she never came back with it. From that hour to this—an interval of seven years—no living soul who knew that beautiful girl has ever set eyes on her again. Every effort to trace her has been in vain. She was seen at the end of the shopping street by a neighbor making her way towards her home. But between the end of that street and the house whose doors she was never to enter again she dropped out of human ken forever.

Among the surprising feats said to be accomplished by these acrobats are double and triple somersaults in the air, double somersaults from the ground to the shoulders, and the forming of pyramids three and four high by tossing the performers in the air, where, after turning a somersault, they land, one above the other. The Florenz Troupe is credited with being the highest-salaried acrobatic act in the world.

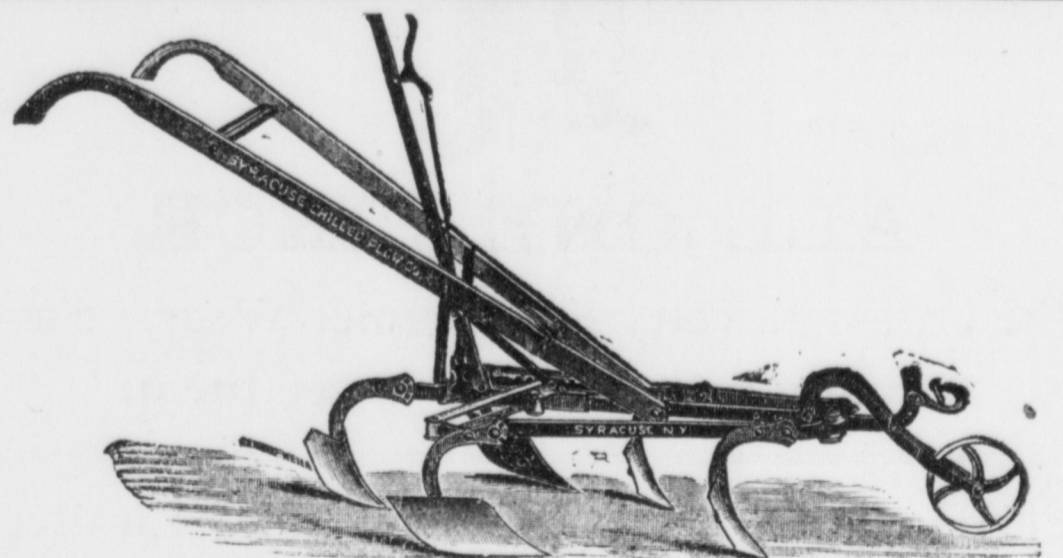
