"The prevalence of appendicitis is an admitted fact," said a surgeon. "I have myself operated on 719 persons for the disease. Crossing the legs is responsible for a good deal of this trouble.

"That sounds strange, doesn't it? Nevertheless, it is a theory advocated by more than one great surgeon. Indeed, I know some men who say that if people never crossed their legs appendicitis would quite disappear.

"You see, crossing the legs squeezes and cramps the delicate vermiform appendix. Squeezed and cramped, the appendix becomes irritated. Inflammation sets in. Intense pain comes. Then—presto—you are on your back, the sweet and heavy fumes of chloroform are choking you, and the appendicitis specialist bends over you with a sharp knife."

### Lectures on Comparative Religion.

Hartford Theological Seminary is arranging for a series of lectures on the religions of the world, which will eventually result in a number of volumes intended to be useful for those who are going into the mission field in various quarters of the world. The first course will be delivered next March and April by Prof. Frank B. Jevons of Durdam University, England, one of the most distinguished scholars in the Church of England, and one who has made the field of comparative religion peculiarly his own. His lectures will consist of an outline of the whole subject of comparative religion. He is the author of an introduction to the "History of Religion." Other courses for the following years are in preparation.

### What To Do Sunday.

"We certainly can give no Sabbath rules," says the New York Outlook. "We cannot say that golf is right and tennis is wrong, or that riding is right and boating is wrong. One may make nature a sacred temple; one may make the church a secular meeting-place for the performance of an irksome duty. The church choir may be a burden; the bird choir may be an inspiration. Yet he who

has human sympathies should find his spirit uplifted by sharing his penitences and his aspirations with others for an hour. If one has no such sympathies, we cannot advise him. A worship which is unpleasing to the worshipper cannot well be pleasing to God. We can only say that the Sabbath is ill spent if it sends us back to our weekly work irritated, wearied, reluctant; and the Sabbath is well spent if it sends us back refreshed in body, mind, and spirit, to take up a round of daily duties and unselfish service with a new inspiration of courage, hope, and patience."

### The War Office and the Camels.

Professor Gregory in his latest book, "The Dead Heart of Australia," makes rather amusing reference to the chapters on the camel in the War Office manual on transport. He had to engage camels at Hergott for his expedition to Lake Eyre, and he had previously learned the chapters by heart:

"There were [he says] three principal points on which the War Office lays stress in its advice as to their selection. Intending purchasers are warned never to buy camels with broken jaws; secondly, to bear in mind that the abdomen should be well rounded, as 'it is a sure sign of a healthy appetite'; the third point to notice is that 'the limbs should be strong and well attached to the trunk.' So far as we could discover the nine camels selected for us had not got broken jaws; we were not particular about the rounded abdomen, for camels with a healthy appetite would have a poor chance of satisfying it in the country to which we were going; and we were glad to see that all the available camels at Hergott had their limbs attached to their trunks."

Professor Gregory accepted the camels recommended to him, and it is satisfactory to learn that throughout the expedition they did their work well.—[Westminster Gazette.
