The special committee of the Fredericton City council to whom was referred the petition of milk dealers, reported recommending that a by-law be passed calling upon all persons selling milk in the city to pay an annual license fee of \$10. Provisions was made for the law not to apply to people keeping only one cow. It was also recommended that the board of health make examination of the herds owned by milk vendors as well as of the milk supplied to citizens. This report was also adopted.

THERE is a case of small-pox on High St. in the house occupied by a family named McGrath. It is Mr. McGrath himself who has it, and while it may run through his own family there is no danger that it will spread as a rigid quarantine of the premises is enforced. The man came from Bath, N. B., and brought the infection with him. The case is a very mild one. Small-pox has been visiting some of the smaller villages in the northern part of the county, but no deaths have occurred.—Houlton Times.
