Insurance Investigations.

In connection with the recent investigation in Ontario into the methods of some of the loan and insurance companies the fact has developed that some otherwise prudent and honorable men are led in the handling of other people's money to do, to say the least, what they would not dare do with their own. There seems to be too great laxity in the law as well as in morals in connection with the handling of trust monies, for such really is that deposited in what is known as "profit sharing" insurance. There are two things that would ensure safety to the policy or ordinary shareholder and prevent a clique of men getting rich on the capital of others. These companies should be compelled to declare their profits annually, and have their books thoroughly audited by the government or some outside independent authority. They should be restricted in their investment of their funds to such securities as cannot in any sense be considered speculative.—Shoe and Leather Journal.

Free Alcohol For Power.

What is known as the "free alcohol bill" has finally passed Congress, and will become law on Jan. 1st next. The object of the bill is to free from inland revenue tax all alcohol used for industrial purposes. One effect of the measure will be to render available a supply of liquid fuel for light manufacturing and heating purposes at less than half the cost of gasoline. Free alcohol will furnish power for pulpers, grain crushers, silo fillers, etc., on the farm, and for light manufacturing in town. Incidentally the measure will create a market for waste potatoes, apples, grain, etc., for the making of alcohol. It will thus confer a double advantage on American farmers. The same advantages should be conferred on Canadian farmers by like legislation at Ottawa. There is ample time to provide for this before the new law goes into effect in the United States.

When planting seed that is very slow to germinate, like parsnip, there is generally considerable trouble in keeping the weeds out, as so many of them have a chance to grow before plants appear to show where the row are. To avoid this trouble, place a radish seed every few inches in the row with the regular planting, and as the radish germinates in a very few days, the rows will be plainly seen, so that one can hoe on each side of it and pull weeds in the row, making it much easier to care for the regular crop when the plants appear.

Farming For a Church.

The women of the church prepared the dinner, and two tents were pitched in the field, one of which was used as a cook tent and the other as a dining tent. After dinner some of the women sat on the riding ploughs that were being used and some who could not get a riding plough took a walking plough and ploughed a few rounds in the field. When the crop is ready for cultivation a similar day will be observed.


