Extraordinary Strike.

A most extraordinary strike took place in London last week. It was planned to begin work this morning on a reservoir in Hampstead, and about 200 men who had been unemployed for months, their families on the verge of starvation, had been engaged to do the digging. When the men arrived on the ground the contractor's foreman told them they would receive 6 1-2 pence per hour. Thereupon about a dozen came forward and demanded 7 pence per hour, refusing to do a bit of work for less. The contractor not yielding to their demand, they walked off. The remainder of the men at once presented a demand for sevenpence an hour and gave the contractor till 10 o'clock to come to their terms. When the clock struck 10 they had not received a satisfactory answer to their demand, and without hesitation they all went away.

The Pope on Total Abstinence.

A general convention of the members of the Catholic Union of Total Abstinence of America was held at Providence, R. I., last week, under the presidency of Bishop Canevin, of Pittsburg. This society has a membership of 100,000 and 800 delegates were present at the meeting.

The basis of the association is total abstinence, and every member must bind himself to abstain from alcohol in every shape and form.

In his opening address the president of the convention read a letter from Pope Pius X. expressing the hope that the Catholic religion will become preeminently the religion of sobriety, and granting numerous indulgences to all those who become members of the association. In his concluding remarks, the Pope says:—"It is our hope that by granting such numerous favors, not only the bishops, priests and members of religious orders, but also the rest of the faithful will make the resolution to show proof of their devotion to the union and become members thereof."

Commenting on the above, the 'Patriot' says: "This communication from the Pope to the Total Abstinence Catholic Union is a manifesto addressed to all the Catholics in the world. The evil must be great to require the head of Catholicity to personally come down into the arena of reform. Religious methods, although perhaps less powerful than formerly, are still the principal arm against abuses and neglect of duty. It rests with the state, that is, the government, and with the citizens who have right to vote, to join their efforts and the resources and influences at their command with the teachings and counsel of the head of Catholicity."

Queen of Spain at Home.

With the youngest sovereigns in Europe at its head, the Spanish court is likely, The Graphic thinks, to see great changes. No court is more bound in strict chains of etiquette and tradition, while old customs die hard at Madrid; but the young king and queen are distinctly modern in tastes, and the spirit of English freedom coming in with the bride, will certainly affect Spanish court life for the future. It is a pretty compliment to Queen Victoria Eugenie that her private apartments in the royal palace at Madrid have been furnished in English fashion, while the many wedding presents arranged in the rooms will further recall her old home and friends. Queen Maria Christina formerly occupied these rooms but she has taken keen interest in refurnishing them for her daughter-in-law, and has now retired to another suite. The royal palace is quite a patriarchal establishment, for not fewer than five separate royal households are quartered beneath its roof. First come the king and queen, then the queen-mother; the Infanta Maria Teresa, only surviving sister of the king, with her newly wedded husband, Prince Ferdinand of Bavaria; the Infante Don Carlos, widower of the king's other sister, and his children—of whom the little Alfonso is heir-presumptive to the Spanish throne; and finally the Infanta Isabella, aunt of the king with her sons. Still, the Madrid palace is one of the largest in the world, so there is plenty of room for so many families in the huge white building with its enormous Italian facade.

To Make Ottawa a District.

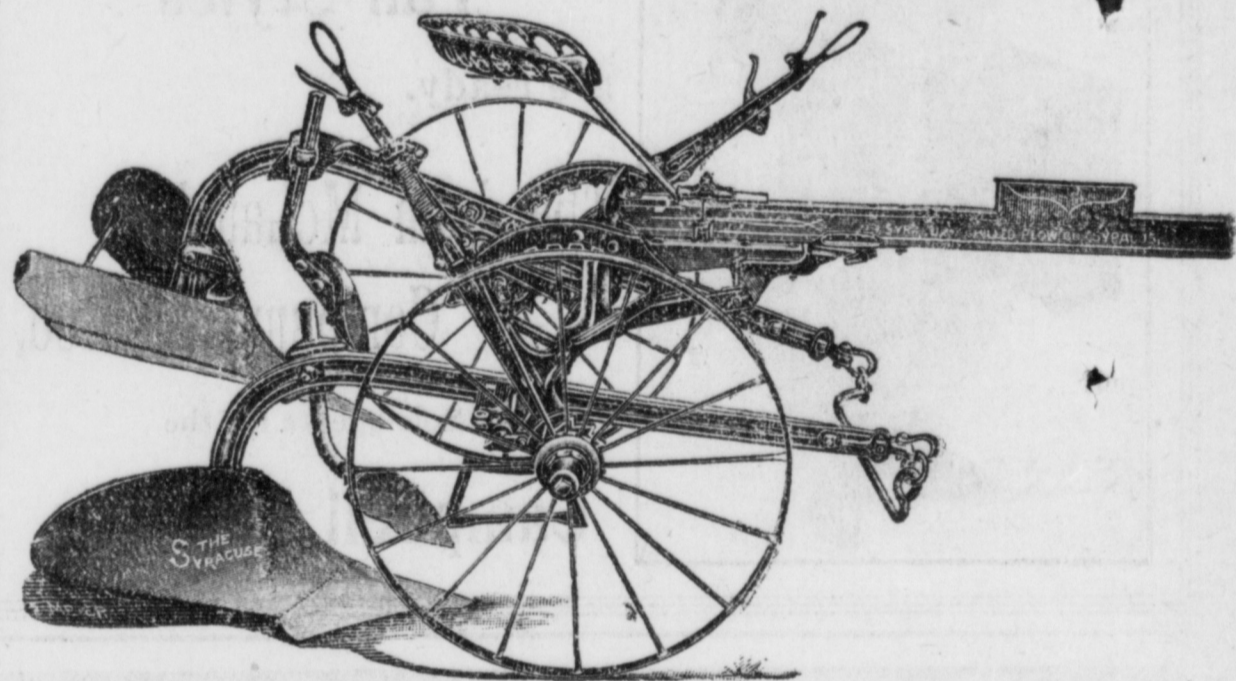

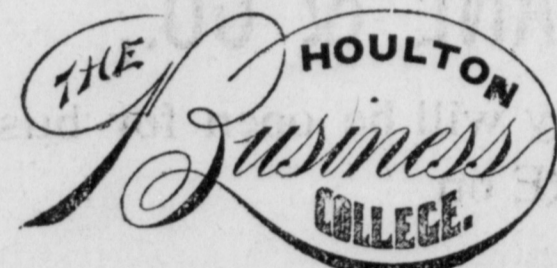
