Postal Savings Banks.

Curiously enough the people of the United States, though so quick and thorough on governmental questions when once aroused, have never yet established a postal savings bank. This is commonly ascribed to the hostility of the ordinary banks. Still, if the people were once awakened this opposition, or any opposition, would soon be swept away. In its imperialistic expansion the United States Government has taken over a postal savings bank in the Hawaiian Islands, and also has met with something of the kind in the Philippines, but has never extended the system to the United States proper. Canadians know the place post-office savings banks fill here; while in England the advantage of an absolutely safe place to deposit small sums of money conveniently is appreciated even more highly. During the past fiscal year in Great Britain the savers deposited \$221,000,000. They also drew from the Government in the form of interest on undisturbed deposits the large sum of \$230,000. There is now in the bank, excluding withdrawals during the year, the enormous sum of \$70,800,000. Financial experts declare that, were it not for the facility the Post Office savings bank offers to the thrifty, the people's savings would not be one-half this sum. When it is considered how grievously poor people suffer in the United States every time there is a bank or loan company failure, and when it is considered what a deterrent these failures are to saving, the wonder is that the people have not been aroused before this to demand a bank in connection with the Government.

Mr. W. Majima, of the Hokkaido Colonial Bank, Japan, is visiting Ottawa, the guest of Consul General Nosse. The special object of Mr. Majima's visit to the Dominion is to study the Canadian banking laws and especially the workings of the trust and loan companies. The bank with which he is connected is a government institution, the subscribed capital \$500,000 on the establishment of the bank being furnished by the Japanese government. The object of the bank is to loan money on the security of real estate to Japanese peasantry at low rates of interest.

Careful weighing shows that an ordinary bee, not loaded, weighs one five-thousandth of a pound, so that it takes 5,000 bees to make a pound. But the loaded bee, when he comes in fresh from the fields and flowers, freighted with honey or bee bread, weighs nearly three times more.

Teaching a Girl to Run an Auto.

Secure a good, easy-going machine with an active and up-to-date sparker, and having placed the girl firmly by your side, where you can secure a strong hold in cases of emergency, proceed to a lonely, unfrequented road where you will be uninterrupted.

If the girl display any sign of nervousness, do your best to soothe her. There are a number of ways to do this. Take her hand in yours and pat it gently. Speak to her in a low, soft tone. If absolutely necessary place her head upon your shoulder and count one hundred. If not effective, repeat in one minute.

Now she may take the wheel, advance the sparker and throw in the clutch. It will then be your turn to grow nervous. While the girl is clutching the machine you clutch the girl. It will then be time to rest. This should not take any longer than the rest of the afternoon.

Voracity of Fishes.

'All the deep sea fishes are enormous eaters,' says John C. Van Dyke, in 'The Opal Sea.' 'There being nothing to eat but the life about them, they live upon one another. They follow the prey like packs of wolves, and in turn are followed, band succeeding band, increasing in size as they decrease in numbers. The herring eat the smaller fish, even their own young; they are harried by the bluefishes, and then comes the insatiate porpoise.' The cetaceans, especially, Van Dyke says, are wonderfully equipped for the consumption of small sea life en masse—'one or two perhaps swallowing thousands of herring at a single gulp.' The seal's appetite is also phenomenal, 'in captivity fifty or more pounds of fish being required daily at a single meal. After gorging himself he goes to sleep, floating on his back with flippers folded, his head bobbing up and down upon the waves as peacefully as upon a bed of roses.—Dundee Advertiser.

The Romance of Missions.

The romance of missions has been illustrated in a singularly interesting fashion in Uganda. On his way to that darkest spot of Africa twenty-one years ago, Bishop Hannington was murdered by the Chief Luba, at the command of King Mwanja. Recently the son of the Bishop, the Rev. J. E. M. Hannington, baptized the son of his father's murderer.

Four thousand different varieties of potatoes were planted at the Burbank farm in California. These constitute a part of the 14,000 branches of the tuber family with which Burbank will experiment this year in his plans to give to the world another new potato. The potato planting was watched by Dr. Shull, one of the Carnegie Institute scientists, who is there getting data for the treatises that are to be written. The potatoes planted are of all sorts and sizes, colors and conditions. Burbank desires that the new potato shall be more prolific; that its yield shall be practically impervious to disease and uniform in size.

Sunday-Closing in France.

A compulsory week-day rest law, recently enacted by the French parliament went into effect September 1st. Its partial observance on the first Sunday following was not sufficient to make any appreciable change in the characteristic Parisian Sunday. The motive behind the law is not religious but social, and its enactment was at the demand of the Socialists, who insisted that working men should have one day in seven for rest. Ordinarily the rest day will be Sunday, but large employers may make arrangements by which their employes will be given a day off in rotation, so that it will not be necessary to suspend business on Sunday.

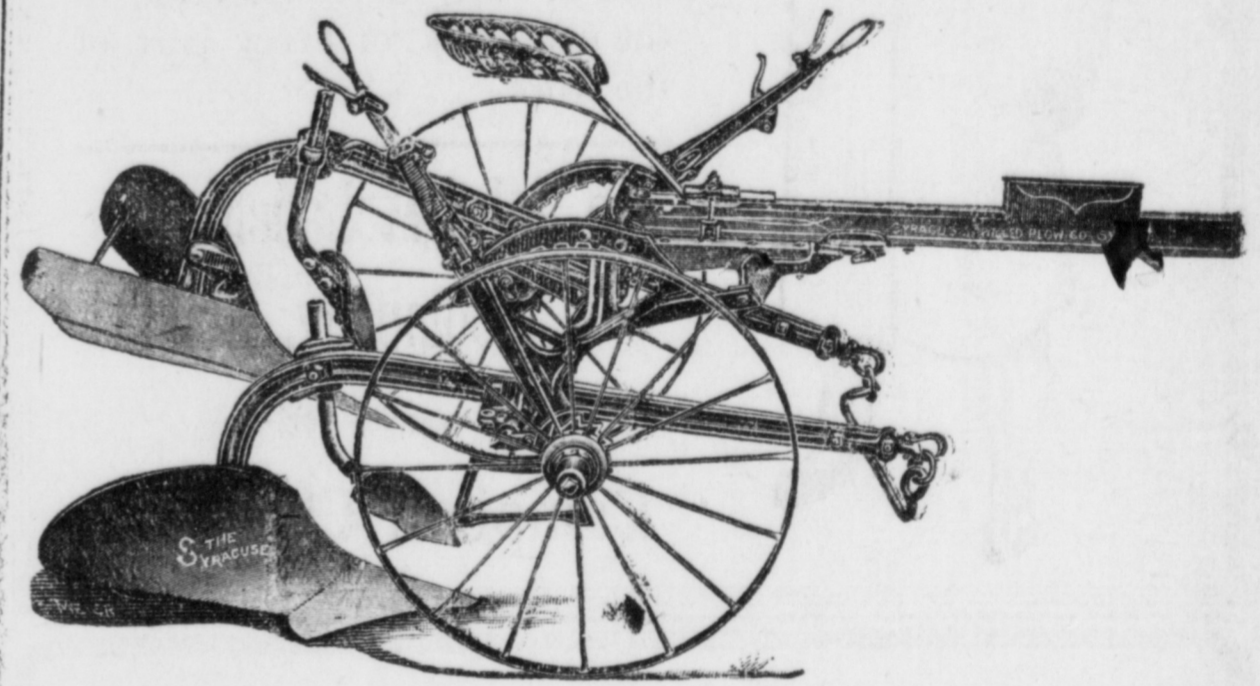
