THE police magistrate of Moncton last Friday sentenced two liquor sellers to jail for one month without the option of a fine, on a first offence. The vendors were very much surprised and grieved for they did not know the law provided such a penalty for the first offence. It appears, however, that in 1904 an amendment to the Canada Temperance Act was passed giving the magistrate power to send violators to jail one month for the first offence and two months for the second, without the option of a fine. This was the first case in which the authority has been exercised in New Brunswick.
