DEAR SIR,—I beg to acknowledge receipt of your favour of the 12th instant forwarding a copy of a resolution passed by the Woodstock Board of Trade with reference to the train service between Woodstock and Plaster Rock. No private individual cares to run a business at a loss from year to year and why the Canadian Pacific should be expected to put a train on between Perth Junction and Woodstock that does not pay expenses I do not understand. We have two trains each way daily except Sunday serving all stations between Woodstock and Presque Isle leaving Woodstock 9.50 a. m. and 12.06 p. m. and arriving 4.20 and 5.25 p. m. We would be only too glad if there was business sufficient to warrant us running another train and we only regret that there is not. We should be greatly pleased if we were able to meet the wishes of the Woodstock Board of Trade in this matter of the additional train but for reasons as stated above I regret exceedingly that we cannot do so.
