The Hub of the Empire.

While London the Large is still the greatest port of the world, as a contemporary points out, it is not making progress so rapidly as others in the volume of its trade, while even its supremacy is threatened. The statistics of last year show that its trade was of the value of \$1,425,000,000, while that of Liverpool was \$1,387,500,000, an approximation that is suggestive and alarming. The trade of Hamburg, which comes next, was worth \$1,150,000 and that of New York \$1,105,000,000. But, while London is at the head, Liverpool has been making a large gain, and, of course, if this continues there will come a time, not very far in the future, when London will lose its present premier position. It is consequently contemplated to ask parliament to create a "docks and harbor authority" for London, the object of which is to take decisive steps to improve London's facility for trade. The docks are to be modeled largely upon those of Liverpool, where no less than thirty million pounds sterling has been spent on them. London contemplates the construction of new landing places and docks at a cost of four or five million pounds, the latter to be large enough to accommodate ships of from 800 to 850 feet long, to respond to the present disposition to build unusually large steamships.

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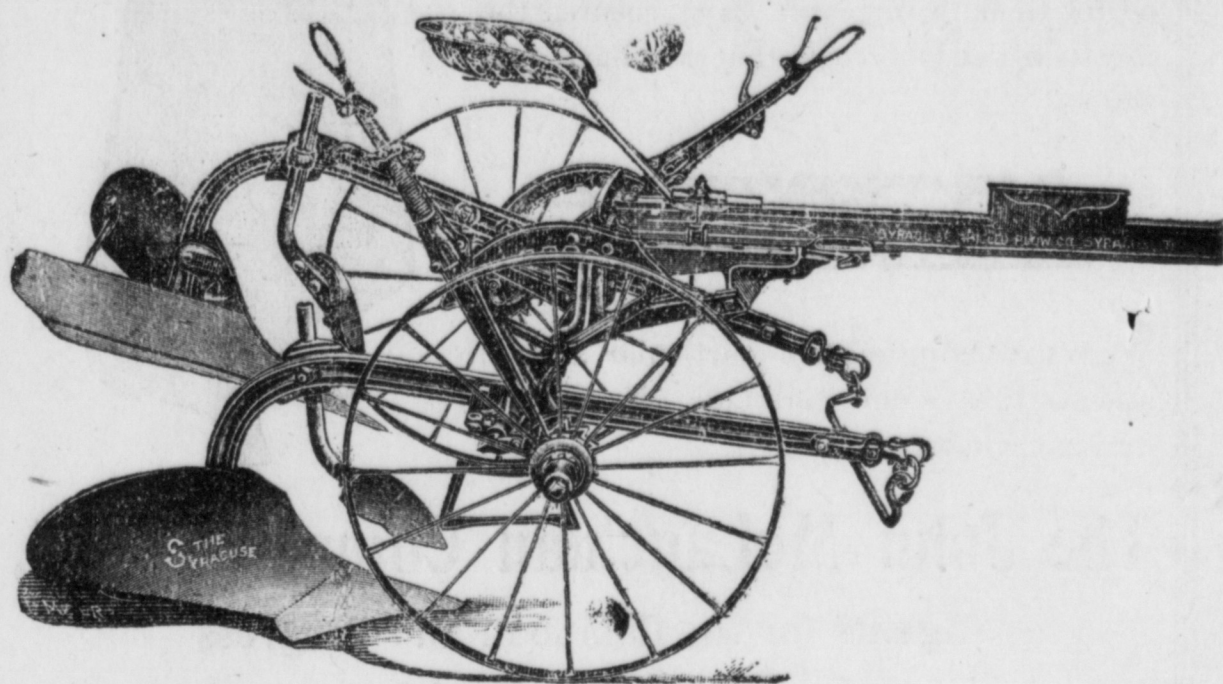
