**To Prevent Gambling in England.**

One of the surprises of the new year in  
England is the coming into operation of the  
new betting act. Very few people seemed  
to realize that such an important bill had  
quietly slipped through parliament at the  
last session. Anyhow, the result is that one  
of London's greatest pests, the street book-  
makers, who used to frequent particular  
beats for the purpose of receiving bets, are  
out of employment. Numbers are advertis-  
ing that they have discontinued business, and  
others are waiting to see whether the act has  
the proverbial loophole. A great reform has  
thus been inaugurated, which will have con-  
siderable influence upon the prosperity of the  
working classes, for witnesses have told of  
the disastrous results which followed from  
street betting, routs gathering outside of  
factories and taking bets from men and  
women alike.

The betting act goes straight to the point,  
and imposes penalties which are not to be  
sneered at. The first offence of frequenting  
a street is met by a fine of £10 (\$50), the  
second of £20 (100) and the third or subse-  
quent offence entails the risk of a £50 (\$250)  
fine or imprisonment for six months.

The law takes a specially grave view of  
betting transactions with boys under sixteen  
years of age, and imposes the severest penalty  
for this offence.

Race courses are specially exempted from  
these restrictions. It seems that it would be  
practically impossible to stop race course bet-  
ting in England.

**Our Relations With Canada.**  
(New York Post.)

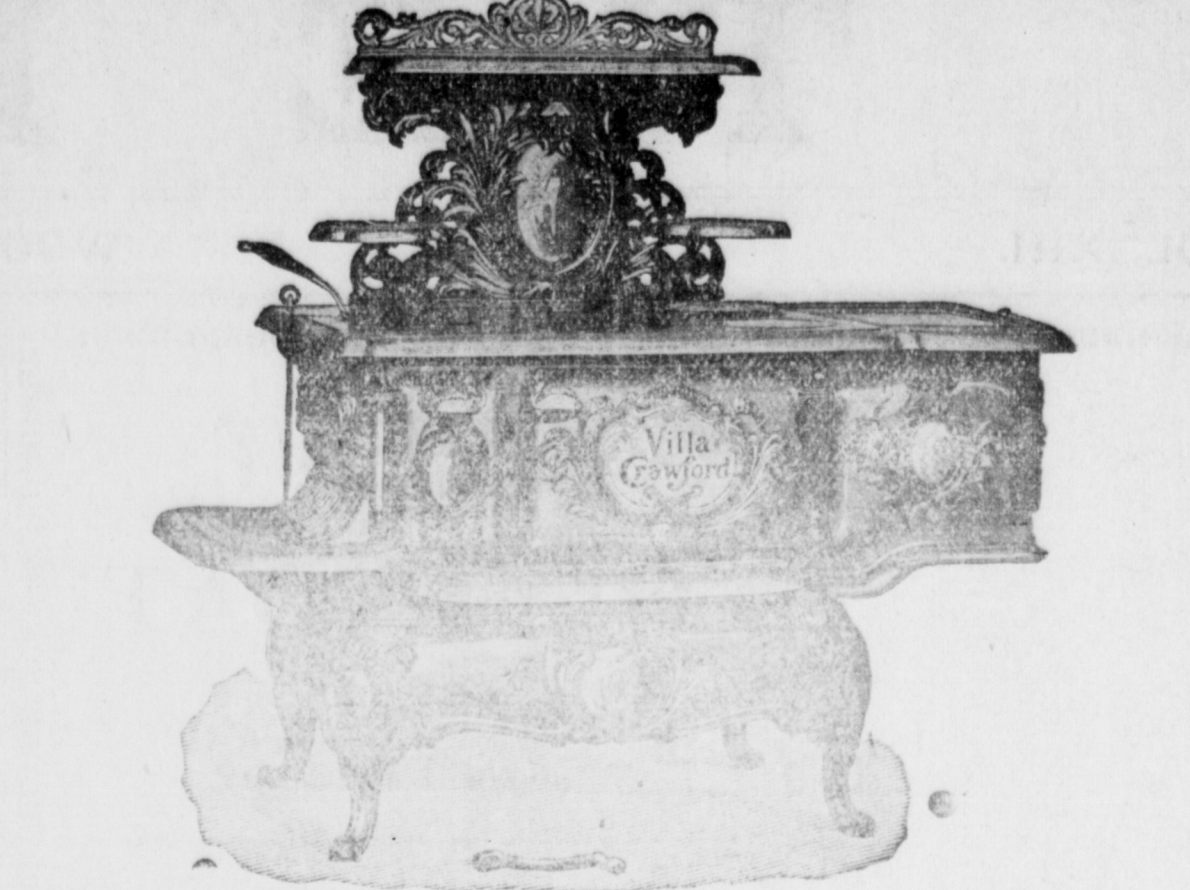
It is an open secret that Secretary Root is  
devoting himself to a settlement of all out-  
standing questions with Canada and New-  
foundland. His visit to Ottawa was carefully  
labelled "social"; but it is sometimes hard to  
draw the line between diplomacy and hospi-  
tality. "Three men around a table" was  
Lord Salisbury's idea of diplomatic opportu-  
nity; and Mr. Root had his feet under the  
same mahogany with several Canadian states-  
men. Whatever he may have learned from  
them could but reinforce the inference from  
many other indications, that now is the time  
to agree with Canada quickly, whilst we are  
in the way with her. The Canadian oppor-  
tunity is one that, for twenty years past,  
American statesmen have fairly incurred re-  
proach for neglecting; it will be a last oppor-  
tunity, if not speedily embraced.

On our side, the desire to reap advantage  
cooperates with the wish to avert loss, in  
prompting to a comprehensive adjustment of  
our relations with Canada. There is profit  
in being on good terms with such a neighbor.  
In New England and along the Great Lakes  
the hope for reciprocal trade agreements with  
Canada has not died out. It may be said to  
have been even heightened. Gov. Guild of  
Massachusetts has lately borne testimony to  
the feeling of his State. Among Massachu-  
setts business men, he states, "I am gratified  
to learn that the sentiment in favor of im-  
mediate tariff revision is overwhelming." That  
looks chiefly northward. New England  
manufacturers wish free coal from Nova  
Scotia. They also desire that something be  
done to prevent their goods from being struck  
by the maximum rate of the pending Cana-  
dian tariff bill. Furthermore, the situation  
is daily growing more critical. The New-  
foundland *modus vivendi* was but for a year.  
It is doubtful if the English Government  
would extend it. A new and larger and more  
permanent arrangement is required. Then  
there is the other fisheries agreement the  
*modus vivendi* which has remained in force  
from year to year since 1888. Under it, American  
vessels have privileges in Canadian ports; but  
there is a strong feeling over the border in  
favor of abrogating it. The Minister of Marine  
and Fisheries said the other day in the Domi-  
nion House of Commons that he would not give  
a definite opinion whether the *modus vivendi*  
should be abolished.

This attitude of comparative indifference  
to trade with the United States is one which  
Canadian statesmen are more and more  
taking, and doing it in all sincerity. The  
Premier himself made a most explicit state-  
ment on the subject, a day or two before Mr.  
Root reached Ottawa. Sir Wilfrid Laurier  
said to the House: "There was a time when  
we would have given a great deal to have  
trade concessions from our American neigh-  
bors. They chose in their own way to refuse  
them. We have done pretty well without  
them, and at the present time we do not  
expect anything of that nature." This is the  
literal truth. Canada today feels herself  
mistress in her own house as never before.  
She is rapidly developing a vast territory in  
the west. Immigration is flowing in at her  
doors. Her manufactures are multiplying.  
Exports are mounting. Canada is today  
building more railroads than the United  
States. Plans are afoot whereby Canadian  
produce can be sent abroad the year round  
without resorting to a single American port.  
There is in all this Imperial as well as  
national politics. The net result is that we  
have today to deal with a Canada in whom  
the sense of pride and self-sufficiency is con-  
stantly strengthening. Canadians have  
thriven under our coldness. What we lost  
by the inconsiderate abrogation of the reci-  
procity treaty with them of fifty years ago  
cannot now be regained.

Still, there are some things which Canada  
frankly wants of us. She would still like a  
free market here for her fish. She would be  
glad to supply Americans with herring and  
cod as cheaply as Senator Lodge's smugglers  
do, and more honorably. Canada has also a  
warm interest in the sealing regulations. There  
too, the United States could offer something  
for something. And there are, as well, a  
few disputes about water power, and its dis-  
tribution, in rivers partially under the juris-  
diction of either country, which ought to be  
composed, and which must enter into any  
complete agreement. In the same speech  
from which we have quoted above, the Cana-  
dian Prime Minister said: "If it were possible  
at this moment to settle all the differences  
which we have at Sault Sainte Marie River,  
Rainy River, Fraser River, Niagara River,  
and also John River, we should be doing as  
much as we can do for Canada in existing  
circumstances."

There is thus far bargaining material; but  
it is not what it was ten years ago, or even  
five. To extract any real gain out of the  
situation, the United States must show a  
much more conciliatory disposition than in  
the past. We have sought to brow-beat Can-  
ada; the time has come to try to placate her.  
No more pressing question confronts us in  
the whole range of our foreign relations. It  
will doubtless be one of the first things taken  
up by Mr. Bryce with Mr. Root this month.
