The Japanese Issue.

A phase of the anti-Japanese agitation has appeared in Southern California. It has no relation to the educational trouble in San Francisco, but it may seriously increase the friction which that treable has caused.

It is in the orange groves, not in school rooms, that antipathy to Japanese has de veloped at this end of the Stare. "Herald" readers will remember that the employment of Japanese orange pickers last year, made necessary by inability to get sufficient white labor, led to serious conditions at times. A repetition of such trouble has begun this year, causing much apprehension in certain sections of the orange belt.

Orange picking has not yet fairly begun nor will it begin fully until after the holidays. Nevertheless, there is incipient trouble already concerning the pickers, notably in the Highland district, east of San Bernardino, and in the continuous Redlands district. Last week, for instance an orange grower in East Highland was hanged in effigy because he employed Japanese pickers. The act was attributed to white pickers who are supposed to be associated in a union.

The situation causes fear that the orange crop may suffer for lack of labor when the marketing season begins at full force. It is conceded that it will be impossible to harvest the crop without resort to Japanese labor. and the San Francisco agitation is likely to influence prejudice when Japanese and white labor are brought together.

A prominent orange grower says: "The coming in of this transient labor from some source is a necessity; there is help enough available here for all the year, exbept the picking and packing season, then we have to mport outside help." It also is said on be half of the growers: "If the Japanese took away employment from one man, or reduced the wages a penny, there might be reason for fault-finding, but they do neither.'

Last year Japanese were subjected to frequent insults where they were employed in the orange groves, and in some cases to brutal attacks by white ruffians. This year a much larger number of Japanese probably will be employed, and it will not be strange if they resent such outrages when they happen to be in sufficient numbers .- [Los Angeles Herald.


