He was assisting his brother James Kelly in cutting wood for dealers in town, and doubtless was taken so ill that he was unable to help himself during the absence of his brother. These two, with a brother, Edward Kelly, now deceased, were masons by trade and built many of the largest buildings in town. Of late years the two brothers, James and John, have been cutting cordwood for Gallagher Bros.

IT IS REPORTED from Ottawa that the Railway Commission has instructed G. F. Shepley, K. C., to enquire into the capital employed and charges made by express and telephone companies, with a view of learning if the present scales of rates imposed by these companies are equitable. This is a most commendable action. The commission has heretofore waited for private individuals to bring grievances before it; it now proposes, apparently, to find out for itself if grievances exist. If this work is thoroughly done, the commission will fully serve the purpose of its creation.
