of the mail-order concerns:
1. You shall sell your farm products for
cash wherever you can, but not to us; we do
not buy from you.
 2. You shall believe our statements and
buy all you need from us because we want to
be good to you, although we are not acquaint-
ed with you.
 3. You shall send the money in advance to
give us a chance to get the goods from the
factory with your money, and meanwhile you
will have to wait patiently a few weeks be-
cause that is our business method.
 4. You shall advertise us at all times and
in all places.
 5. You shall buy your church bells and in-
terior church fixtures from us and forward
the money in advance, for that is our busi-
ness method.
 6. You shall collect from the business men
in your vicinity as much money as you can
for the benefit of your churches. Although
we get more money from you than they do,
still it is against our rules to donate money
for building country churches.
 7. You shall buy your tools from us and
be your own mechanic in order to drive the
mechanic from your vicinity for we wish it so.
 8. You will induce your neighbor to buy
everything from us, as we have room for
more money.
 9. You shall often look at the beautiful
pictures in our catalogue so your wishes will
increase and you will send in a big order,
although you are not in immediate need of the
goods; otherwise you might have some left to
buy necessary goods of your local merchants.
 10. You shall have mechanic who repairs
the goods you buy from us, book the bill, so

Canadian Soil and the V. C.
(Saturday Night.)

The only Victoria Cross won on Canadian
territory was that given to a private of the
Rifle Brigade, named O'Hea. "The exploit,"
writes A. L. Haldon, in his recently pub-
lished Book of the V. C., "was performed at
a railway siding between Quebec and Mon-
treal in June, 1886, while O'Hea was acting
as one of an escort in charge of an ammu-
nition wagon. To everybody's alarm a fire
broke out, enveloping the car in flames and
smoke. Inside were kegs of powder and
cases of ammunition, which, did they ignite,
would cause a most terrible explosion. While
the others hesitated, O'Hea snatched the
keys from the sergeant's hand, opened the
door of the van, and called for volunteers
to bring him water and a ladder. The latter
was easily procured, and standing on this
plucky private emptied bucketful after bucket-
ful upon the burning wood. It was a
touch-and-go business, as the tongues of
flame shot out every now and then, coming
dangerously near to the powder kegs, but
O'Hea stuck to his post, and he fought the
fire under.

Though the Rifle Brigade has fourteen
crosses to their credit, won in the Crimes, in
India and in South Africa, I rather fancy
that not one of them was gained in circum-
stances of more deadly peril, and his com-
rades were well pleased when Private Timothy
O'Hea's name went to swell the proud list of
V. C. heroes. O'Hea was afterwards lost in
the Australian bush.

the demand on the part of the United States
was just. For four years the British Gov-

ernment did its utmost, under most trying
circumstances, to maintain neutrality, while
its people were suffering grievously from the
loss of cotton. That it ever connived at the
escape of a cruiser, or at any infraction of
neutrality whatever, is utterly untrue. The
arrest of the Alabama was delayed by mere
accident. She sailed without a clearance on
a pretended party of pleasure, and without
her armament, which she took on board at
the Azores. The order for her arrest was on
its way. Nations which think fit to make
war and put the neighborhood to great trou-
ble and loss must be content if the laws of
neutrality are faithfully observed, though
there may be an occasional slip. The posi-
tion of the British Government was made
more difficult by the solemn and ex-
plicit disclaimer on the part of the
American Government of any design to
abolish slavery, which threw sympathy to
the side of the newly-born nation, struggling
for its life. Let American historians, when
they deal with this case, compare the conduct
of the British Government with that of their
own Government in the case of the Cuban
insurrection, or that of the Fenian invasion
of Canada. Policy has its necessities, but
history has its rights.

Tonics.

A great deal of harm is done by self-drug-
ging for the relief of various real or imagi-
nary ills.
Every man, of course, believes himself a
doctor, and often thinks he is better able to
attack a cough or a case of rheumatism or a

special study. All he has to do is to make
up his mind what the trouble is,—and any

So it is with the headache. Almost any

in cod-liver oil; or finally by stimulating the
tissues to increased absorption, an action
which is ascribed to arsenic, mercury, and
others of the mineral tonics.

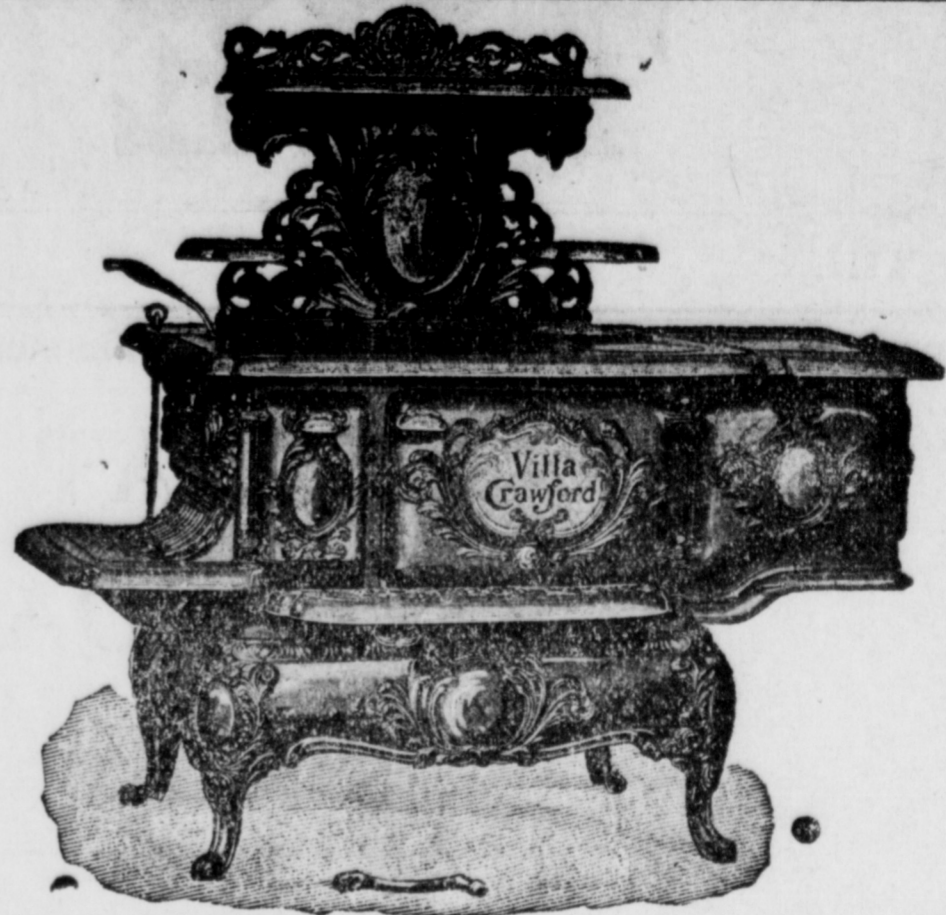
But these are not the "tonics" to which
people are apt to resort when they run down.
They take to stimulants, alcohol usually, and
think they are getting strong, because they
feel better after each dose. The alcohol in
the "tonic" is often distinguished, and the
user, perhaps a conscientious teetotaler,
would be shocked to learn that what he was
taking to give him strength had more alcohol
in it than has the strongest whiskey. If the
system is seriously run down, a physician
should be consulted, who will be able to give
what is needed, whether iron, or bark, or
genuine, or cod-liver oil, to correct the under-
lying condition that causes the debility.
