A Misunderstood Scientist.

Dr. William Osler's statement made near-
ly two years ago, that "man's best work is
done before forty," which he meant in a pre-
paratory sense, created a world-wide sensa-
tion at the time, its signification being
thoughtlessly and injuriously perverted. It
is only lately that it has received its true
interpretation.

Taking advantage of Dr. Osler's presence
in Canada recently (whither he came to cele-
brate the centenary of his beloved mother,)
Mr. Charles Leonard-Stuart, the well-known
encyclopaedist, wrote to him for accurate in-
formation. The reports of the professor's
famous address to the students at John Hop-
kins University were so distorted, that
"oslerized" has become a familiar term.

Dr. Osler's real words on that occasion
were:

"The teacher's life should have three
periods—study until twenty-five; investiga-
tion until forty; profession until sixty, at
which time I would have him retired on a
double allowance. Whether Anthony Trol-
lope's suggestion of a college and chloroform
should be carried out or not, I have become
a little dubious, as my own time is getting so
short."

This is very different from the generally
accepted idea that he asserted that man's
creative usefulness ended at forty, and sug-
gested his chloroforming at sixty. In an
encyclopaedic article on medicine, Dr. Osler
writes thus on age:

"Within the past three centuries, the aver-
age working life of English-speaking men has
doubled. A few lived as long as now, and
some strong or favored ones had efficient
working powers as long; but the common
life was worn out in what is now middle
age. In Shakespeare's time, the fifties were
venerable: 'Old John of Gaunt, time honored
Lancaster,' was fifty-eight when supposedly
so addressed; and Admiral Coligny, murdered
at fifty-three, is described by his contempo-
rary biographer as a very old man. Now,
when we hear of a death in the sixties, we
instinctively feel it an untimely cutting-off
in what should be still fresh and vigorous
age and even at eighty it seems but just fair
ripeness for the sickle."

Even at this late date, it is a matter of
general interest to have the professor's po-
sition accurately defined. It was a singular
instance of a man suddenly becoming famous
for what he did not say, whereas what he did
say was very much more to the point than
the sentiments popularly, but erroneously,
attributed to him.—Christian Herald.

Some months ago Everybody's Magazine
sent Charles E. Russell on a tour of the
world for the investigation of economic con-
ditions in foreign lands and especially for in-
quiry as to the manner in which the peoples
of Europe, Asia and Australasia are dealing
with the problems which beset the people of
the United States. In the current issue Mr.
Russell draws his conclusions from the
evidence already published. He says that
elsewhere than in the United States men are
coming to the conclusions that modern con-
ditions have rendered useless the old theo-
ries of government, and that for the ill modern
conditions create two things must be done:
First to substitute the interests of the com-
munity for the interest of the fortunate or

powerful individual. Second* to restrain
Greed not by regulating it but by making
impossible some of its most obvious and
dangerous operations.

He states public ownership achievements
in a nutshell.

"In the British towns they did not think it
enough to limit the plunder that gas com-
panies and traction companies might take
from the public; they did away with the
plunder by doing away with the companies.
In Germany and Switzerland they did not
think it enough to tell the corporations to be
good and stop lurking in dark alleys with
sandbags for defenceless citizens; they took
away the sandbags and fenced up the dark
alleys and made it impossible for corpora-
tions to operate except in broad daylight and
under the eyes of a policeman. All about
Europe they did not think it enough to de-
clare that meatpackers should not furnish
diseased or rotten meat except under the
official seal of the government; they did
away with these disease—germs by doing
away with the private packing house. In
England they did not think it enough to
regulate telegraph rates; they abolished the
graft of watered stock and extortionate
charges by abolishing the telegraph com-
panies. In Switzerland, Italy, Germany, Japan,
Australia, New Zealand, all about Europe,
they did not stop to bother with flabby and
fictitious laws purporting to forbid rebates
and railroad swindles; they put an end to re-
bates and swindles by making the railroad an
instrument for the Common Good instead of
an instrument for Private Gain. In London
the county council was not content to tell
property-owners to build nice tenement
houses for their tenants; it bought land
and built the tenements itself.

"In other words, the substance of all
these mighty movements around the world
has been to create conditions under which a
part at least of the predations of wealth
would be impossible."

Nor are any of these peoples dissatisfied
with their bargains. Simply a business propo-
sitions without regard to theory or senti-
ment these arrangements are regarded as
sound. The spirit of the Common Good,
with its tremendous and almost unknown
possibilities has led them into what they feel
to be the right track.

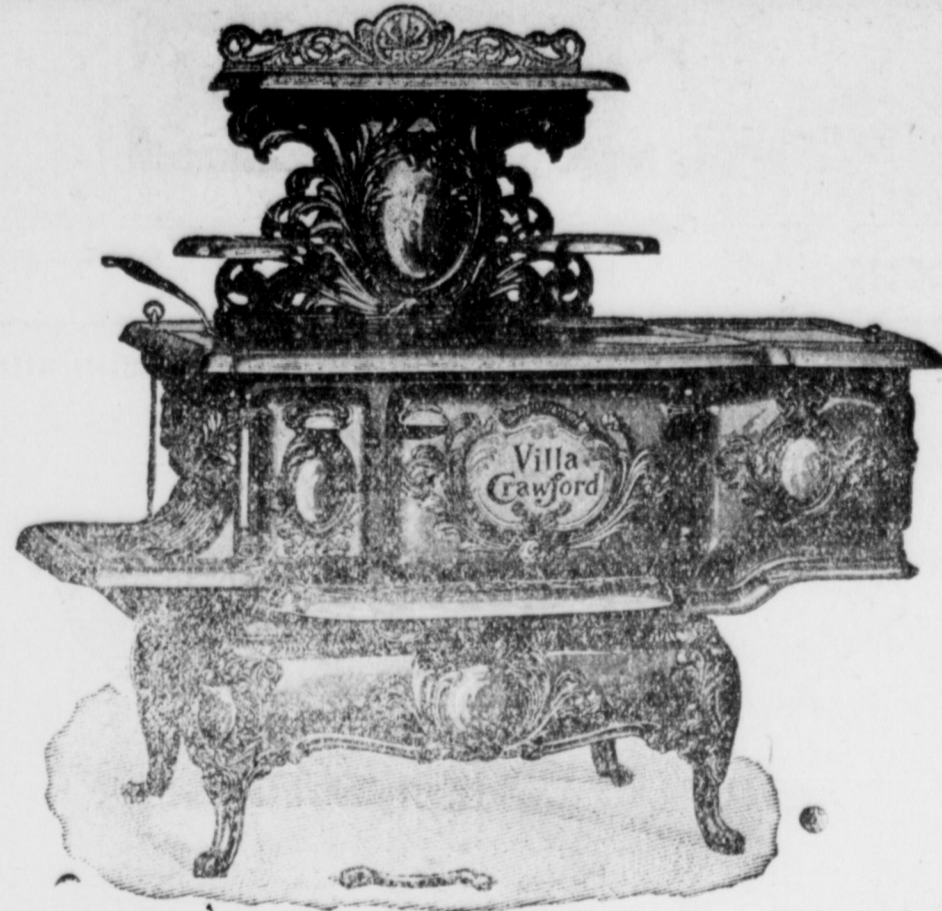
