Grading and Crossing.

Grading up cattle is the process of build-  
ing up the grade of the desired breed to a  
higher standard. This is done by coupling a  
pure-bred sire with cows of mixed breeding,  
and following with males of the same breed  
on the resulting offspring. The first offspring  
is usually denominated a half blood of the  
breed of the sire; the next is three-fourths,  
and the third generation seven-eighths, and  
so on.

Cross-breeding is the coupling a pure-bred  
male of one breed with a pure-bred female of  
a different breed. This is a practice usually  
condemned by all breeders, though sometimes  
resulting with a superior individual, from  
the fact of thus grafting on a strain of the  
blood of a more vigorous animal. This course  
cannot be recommended for general practice,  
with the exception, perhaps, of the Short-  
horn and Hereford breeds, where the union  
of a Hereford bull with Shorthorn cows, pure  
or high grade, has brought the finest white-  
faced steers ever bred in the State. But a  
second cross in the same line has not gener-  
ally proved equally as desirable.

The first warm days of spring bring with  
them a desire to get out and enjoy the ex-  
hilarating air and sunshine. Children that

Absinthe is Banned.

Absinthe seems doomed in Switzerland.  
The Canton of Vaud was the first to prohibit  
the retail of the spirit, and when a referen-  
dum was demanded the result was emphati-  
cally against absinthe. The Canton of Geneva  
then followed suit and has prohibited the  
Green Fairy, with the support of many thou-  
sand voters. The adversaries of absinthe  
have been encouraged by their success to  
make it a Federal movement, and 170,000  
signatures have been obtained to a petition  
against the drink, and cantons which do not  
suffer from the form of alcoholism making  
common cause with those which do. The  
interesting thing about this movement is that  
it has not been engineered by parliamentary  
agitators, but has grown up spontaneously  
among the people, who are disgusted with  
the crimes committed under the influence of  
absinthe. The temperance societies have  
sent out a great number of canvassers to  
collect signatures, all of them unpaid, and  
these people have also been provided with  
leaflets setting forth the arguments in favor  
of the suppression of absinthe, and facts with  
which to controvert any objections that may  
be made. The movement has been organized  
by individual effort, supported by public  
opinion, and it seems more than likely that  
in a very short time the sale of absinthe will  
be prohibited all over Switzerland.—London  
Globe.

Gang of Burglars Unearthed.


The Montreal detective force have un-  
earthed what they think is a wide burglary  
conspiracy. The head of it is a man named  
Marjorie Gagnon, a boot and shoe manu-  
facturer, in whose place of business goods  
have found at least \$5,000 worth of goods  
from balls to jewelry. This amount they  
think is only a part of the spoil taken by the  
burglary syndicate. Another man, named  
Ismael Bournette, has been arrested also.  
The police lit upon Gagnon when looking up  
the records of men convicted in the United  
States and now living in Montreal, in the  
hope that they might strike a clue which  
would help them to stop the burglary  
epidemic. They struck Gagnon's record and  
found that he had served a long term in Sing  
Sing.

Beavers.

Beavers have a great fancy for wandering  
during the early summer months. They have  
been known to appear in localities where they  
have been extinct for years. A few years  
ago, the farmers near a small lake in the  
County of Lanark were astonished to find the  
waters of the lake suddenly rising and over-  
flowing their meadows. When they came to  
seek the cause, they discovered that a single  
pair of beavers had built a dam across the  
small stream that formed the outlet to the  
lake, and so had raised the water. Where  
these beavers came from no one knows, as  
they had been extinct in that locality for  
nearly a century.—Canadian Baptist.
