**Liquor Dealers Stop Gambling.**

The Texas Brewers' Association has started a campaign to keep the saloons in the whole of the State free from gambling. The reason of the movement is found in the fear that State legislation would operate adversely to the liquor interests in closing the saloons where gambling went on. The liquor dealers have given a bond of \$500,000 that they will keep the saloons free from cards, dice, and dominoes and other gambling games. Ten thousand notices have been sent out to saloon keepers, and a fund of \$200,000 has been provided by the association for the organization of a secret service corps of 500 men to furnish evidence of violations of the law. Hundreds of these detectives are now scouring the State and saloon-keepers who permit gambling or even allow cards to be played will be prosecuted.

**The "No-Breakfast" Habit.**  
(Boston Advertiser.)

Perhaps the way to a man's brain, as the way to his heart, is through his stomach. If this can be proved, then the explanation of the no-breakfast fad is reached. It is the fact that one of the ways of evolution from the life of our immediate ancestors has been the practical elimination of the American breakfast. Mayor McClellan is one of the latest public men to find themselves celebrated for their abstention from the morning meal, and there are countless equally prominent who claim the same distinction—in fact it is no longer a distinction. The old fashion of sitting down the first thing in the morning and partaking of a meal which would compare favorably, for quantity and quality, with a heavy dinner, has passed with the coming of the modern way of doing business. Whether or not it better serves us physically is yet to be determined—the prevalence of nervous breakdowns may or may not have some bearing.

The most curious feature of this evolution of habit, however, lies in the fact that whereas we have adopted this no-breakfast habit from European countries, the adoption is illogical. It may fairly be assumed that the habit abroad owes its existence to the fact

that business in those countries is light and easy in the forenoon. It is odd that as our own forenoons have become more and more crowded with accomplishment, we have adopted a meal system born of a diametrically opposite situation. As a matter of fact, however, a goodly proportion of those who boast of their two-meals-a-day regime are deceiving themselves; they have their "breakfast" just before they go to bed. The old-time American who loaded up with heavy food in the morning did not have a midnight lunch. The modern American who omits the breakfast usually does have it.

**Chinese Torture Tried in a School.**  
(London Chronicle.)

A drop of water, even three or four drops, falling on the head seems a thing unworthy of attention; nevertheless, in China a slow and continuous dropping of water on the head has been found to be a method of torture under which the most hardened criminal abjectly howls for mercy. When a professor in the Sorbonne stated this to his class the other day, one of the students laughed incredulously, and said it would take a good deal of that sort of thing to affect him. The professor assured him that even one quart of water dropped slowly on his hand would be beyond his endurance. He agreed to experiment.

A quart measure filled with was brought in; a microscopic hole was bored in the bottom, and the performance began, the professor counting. During the first hundred drops the student made airy remarks. With the second hundred he began to look less cheerful then gradually all his talk died away, and his face took on a haggard, tortured expression. **The Lost Ten Tribes.**

In support of the theory that the English speaking race is descended from the lost ten tribes of Israel, says the Toronto News, the Rev. Alfred Bareham of Maitland in an address delivered under the auspices of the Anglo-Israel Association at Broadway Hall on Thursday night pointed out that it had been a divine promise to the Israelites, as distinct from the Jews, that they should become the dominating nation of the world. The method of the construction of the English language was, he contended, similar to that of the Hebrew, while in the superimposed crossing forming the Union Jack could be traced the symbols of the name of Christ. Mr. Bareham's chief argument was that the origin of the Saxon race had been traced to the shore of the Caspian Sea, and to a time corresponding with the date of Assyria when the Israelites disappeared from history, and probably migrated in a northerly direction.
