Excessive Drinking.
 Henry Morton, 37 years of age, an employee in the Grand Trunk Railway's accountancy department, died on Saturday evening, March 30th, in a cell at police headquarters, Montreal. Morton was taken to the station at 4 30 o'clock on Saturday afternoon for protection by Constable Daignault, who found him, under the influence of liquor, in Craig street east. There did not appear to be anything wrong with him when he was placed in a cell, and he laughed and joked with the turnkey. Shortly after eight o'clock, when the turnkey was visiting the cells, he noticed that Morton looked pale. In response to an inquiry, Morton replied that he was not well. Lieutenant Hebert then summoned Dr. Picotte, the police surgeon, to the station. When the physician arrived he ordered that Morton be removed to a hospital. An ambulance was summoned from the Notre Dame Hospital, but before it reached the station Morton had expired. The body was then removed to the morgue.
 The deceased was an Englishman, and boarded at 27 Gain street. He came to this country from London in September last, leaving his wife behind, to come out later if he succeeded here. Morton drew his month's salary on Saturday and seems to have at once proceeded to drink it up. When found by Constable Daignault he had \$17.50 in his pockets and was in a helpless state of intoxication. Dr. Picotte is of the opinion that death was due to the effects of excessive drinking.

The Grand Trunk officials have cabled the news to Morton's friends in London. Meanwhile Coroner McMahon is investigating.

Ventilating London.

Skyscrapers were advocated by Mr. A. Hudson, at a lecture at the Surveyors' Institution, for the purpose of ventilating London.

The best natural ventilator of London, said Mr. Hudson, was the Thames. The London parks were also most important ventilators.

The action of motors in stirring up germ-laden dust was a very serious item. In future, windows in many streets might have to be used purely for the admission of light. In that case the ventilation would chiefly have to be derived from shafts running down the middle of the house.

Mr. Hudson thought that tall blocks of buildings here and there throughout London would constitute health resorts for those who lived in the upper storeys, whilst those who lived in the neighborhood of these high buildings would have the ventilation of their houses vastly improved by the eddies round these lofty buildings.

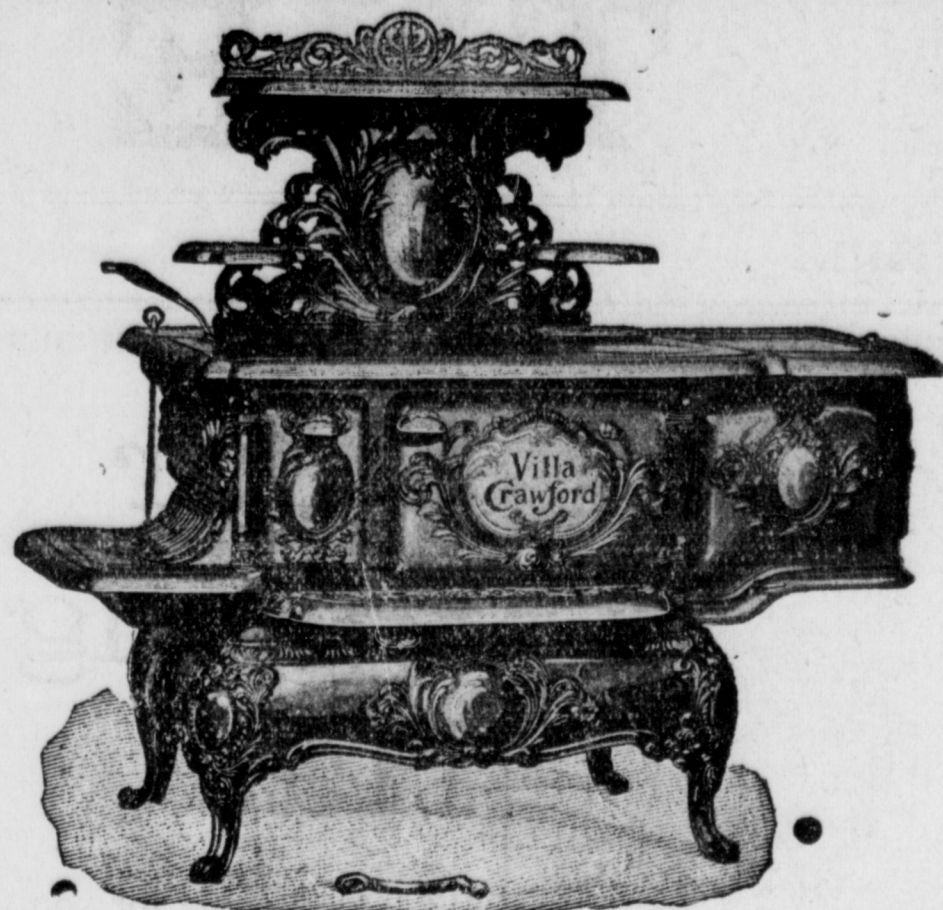

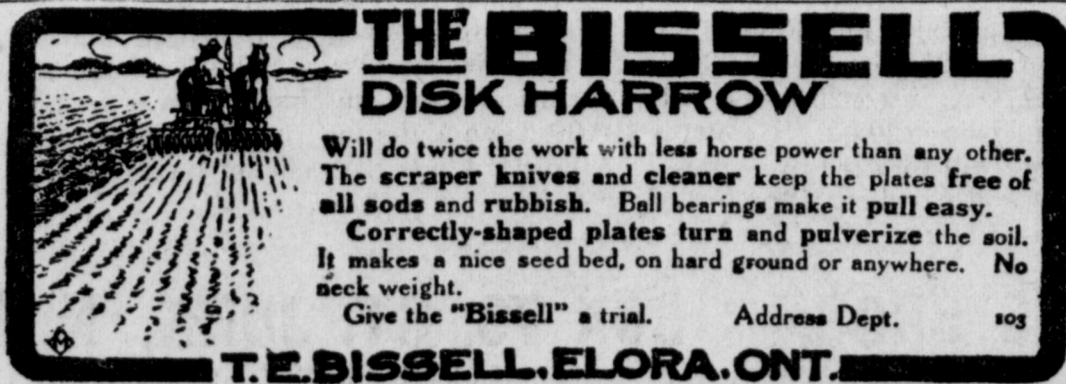
