### The Legislature.

Some days ago a bill to allow the city of Fredericton to discharge its crude sewage into the river St. John was defeated by the casting vote of the speaker.

Now Mr. Clair, who voted against the bill, is moving for its reconsideration. He contends that he was misinformed as to the conditions in Sunbury when he voted and will take a different course next time. The citizens of Fredericton are hopeful that the bill will pass when it next comes before the house.

The Hon. Mr. Pugsley introduced a bill to provide for the purchase of certain lands from the N. B. Railway Company. He stated that an agreement had been entered into to purchase 50,000 acres of land in the northern part of the province for settlement at seventy-five cents an acre. Such lands to be sold to actual settlers at the same price and the cost of survey. The land would be divided into 100 acre lots and none but bona fide settlers would be allowed to purchase. The object of the bill was to give the government a clear title to these lands when bought and paid for.

Even the best eggs may cause digestive disturbance through the idiosyncrasy of certain individuals, but Le Coq, a French physiologist, reports that some eggs develop a real poison, which he names ovotoxine. Its presence is usually marked by a peculiar putrid odor, which in the white may be so slight as to escape notice. The toxine may be present in fresh eggs, but much more often occurs in those that are stale, and mixing broken eggs with cream—as is done so frequently by bakers—is especially liable to produce the septic alteration. Feeding hens with mouldy or diseased meat is a fruitful source of the infection of the white of eggs. This investigator would condemn all desiccated and preserved eggs, and as there is no way of distinguishing safe fresh eggs, he would insist that all eggs to be eaten should be well boiled or sterilized by other thorough cooking, and particularly that raw eggs should not be used with cream in pastry.
