## Stallions Should be Worked.

Among the questions that present themselves to the horse breeder none is perhaps more important than how to get a suitable sire to mate with brood mares, says a Wisconsin agriculturist. On this question depends whether the blood in the mare is going to be improved in the progeny or allowed to degenerate. When selecting a sire the main points to go by are the looks of the animal and its pedigree. But these two factors—however important they are—cannot alone secure an efficient offspring. It must be remembered that what is required in a horse is strength and vitality, and these qualities are not necessarily combined with a good conformation, a smooth surface, shiny coat and heavy weight. Fat increases weight and makes the horse look well to an uncritical observer, but it does not increase strength. On the contrary, it will diminish the working strength of the muscles, the strength that will last. A fat man may be as strong as a bear for a moment, but "in less than no time" will be exhausted. It is the same with horses. It is hard fibre without much connective tissue that is needed, and there is only one way to obtain this—through work.

It is a fact that the quality of the individual is subject to heredity as well as the quality of the breed or family. Consequently a well-trained, strong stallion, with muscles well worked up, is bound to get a better progeny than a soft, fat and lymphatic animal, whose muscles and lungs never had a chance to develop fully. This is evident enough and is furthermore confirmed by experience. Thus the two most speedy breeds of the world, the English thoroughbred and the American trotter, are produced by selecting for breeding purposes only the animals which have been trained and worked.

In foreign countries they have made experiments to improve a poor, native stock by picking out some of the best looking animals for breeding and giving them proper training. The results gained in the first generation are often surprising, and most always a marked improvement is seen in the get. A well-bred stallion represents quite a capital, and it will, of course be in the interest of the owners to obtain the greatest profit possible from him. But it is extremely short-sighted to think only of the cash income in service fees, the amount gained in that way being insignificant when compared to the large sums the offspring may represent. Nevertheless it is too frequently seen that owners of stallions, whether they be companies or individuals, speculate in the service fees and don't care for the rest. They generally keep their animals confined in a narrow stall the year round, except during the breeding season.

But during this strenuous period the stallion gets work enough. Untrained as he is after months of idleness, he is driven around all day to serve too large a number of mares. This system is not rational. It is injurious to the stallion and wears him out before his time. And it will show its effect on the foal he begets, which in most instances will prove to be of an inferior quality. So loss is more certain than gain in such a system of breeding.

## The Coming of Halley's Comet.

As everybody knows, the famous comet of Halley, the brightest of all comets known to pay periodical visits to the neighborhood of the sun, is expected to reappear in the sky within a few years. Astronomers all over the world are now interested in the problem of predicting the precise time of its perihelion passage, or nearest approach, to the sun. Several predictions have already been published. The latest is that made by Messrs. Crommelin and Cowell before the Royal Astronomical Society in January. Calculating the probable effects of the interference of the various planets with the comet's progress in its orbit, they think that the date of the next perihelion will fall before the middle of May, 1910. The last previous perihelion passage of the comet was in November, 1835.

The import and export trade of the four principal commercial nation of the world in 1906 was as follows:

United States.....	1,797,320,100	1,313,667,900
France.....	981,801,700	1,017,959,900

The Springfield Republican, in commenting on these figures, say: "The United States comes third in point of total foreign trade, but last in trade relative to population—the per capita foreign trade of the United Kingdom being \$100.15 compared with \$55.44 for Germany, \$50.76 for France, and \$36.96 for the United States. All except the United Kingdom are protective tariff nations, and no one of them shows a per capita foreign trade much in excess of one-half that of Great Britain. The United States has the highest tariff of all, and the smallest per capita foreign trade."

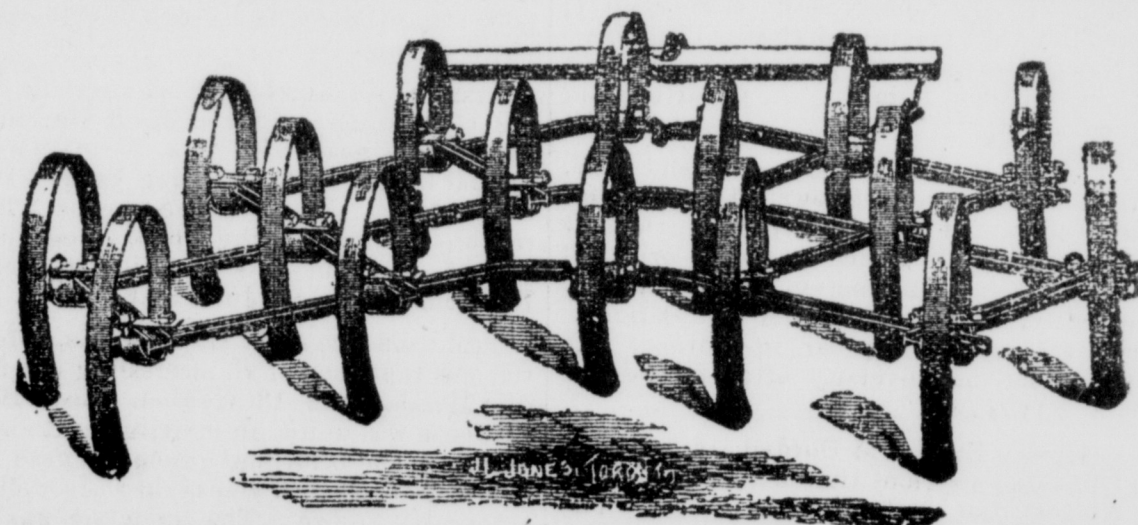
