



THE water in the river continues to fall very fast and unless heavy rain comes a large percentage of the season's cut in the Upper St. John river is certain to be hung up. There is still considerable snow in the woods, but it is not melting rapidly enough to do the lumbermen any good. Very few logs have reached the booms during the past five days.

THE University of New Brunswick will confer the degree of Ph. D. (Doctor of Philosophy) on David W. Hamilton, principal of the Consolidated school at Kingston. The degree will be confierred on Eucoenia day, May 30th. Mr. Hamilton's thesis, The Weeds of New Brunswick, will probably be published in bulletin form by the department of agriculture.

Ar Fredericton on Friday, Dr. and Mrs. L. W. Bailey gave a farewell reception for the students of the University at the new science building. Dancing was the principal amusement and the function passed off very pleasently. It is Dr. Bailey's intention to spend the coming summer in Europe. He retires from the university after forty-seven years' service.

GILMAN BROS. and Burden are reported to be having a serious time with their drive of 4,00,000 feet on the Pokiok stream. The dam at the foot of Dead water, four miles above the mill, broke a few days ago, and the rush of water which followed was the means of carrying away portions of two other dams further down. The accident has seriously handicapped the river driving operations.

MRS. MICHÆL CRANE, of Beechwood, died on Monday the 6th, the result of taking a dose of carbolic acid. Mrs. Crane had been in poor health for some time, and was not considered to be in her right mind. On Saturday morning she got up in order to assist in getting breakfast and unobserved by her husband or son, drank the contents of the bottle and threw it into the stove. She then started to go up-stairs remarking that she was "going to die," and asked for assistance. The family not realizing what she had done, but seeing that she was in great pain immed-tately sent for help, and telephoned for Dr. Cummins, but when he arrived it was too late. The unfortunate woman lingered until Monday morning when she died.

WORK on the Grand Trunk Pacific in New Brunswick was commenced this week, the first operations having been begun on Division 5, which is between Edmundston and the Quebec Boundary. This contract is held by Lyons and White. Engineer Longley, of the general staff, is in charge. Work has also been begun at two other places, one con-tract starting quite near Grand Falls and the other some distance farther up. Edmundston is now experiencing a decided boom on ac-count of being the headquarters for sections. Real estate has increased in price, and houses command almost any rent. Well-todo families are moving out and renting their furnished residences to officials. Recently two furnished cottages rented for \$45 and \$35 per month respectively. Many residents will camp out until fall, and rent their houses at sums varying from \$30 to \$50 per moath.






