**The Passing of the Pulpwood.**

(Toronto Globe.)

Few even of those who take a scientific or economic interest in forestry are aware of the gravity of the danger that threatens North America from the present rapid diminution of the supply of pulpwood. It is no exaggeration to say that at the present rate of consumption the available supply in the United States will in a few years be completely exhausted, while the supply in Canada will be greatly diminished. But the present rate of consumption will not remain unchanged; it will steadily and rapidly increase with the amount of white paper that is consumed in keeping up the enlarging circulation of newspapers and other periodicals of the day.

Hitherto there has not been in either of these countries any systematic effort made to ascertain what the total supply of pulpwood amounts to, and now there is impending among American publishers something like a panic caused by the discovery of the undoubted fact that an absolute dearth of pulpwood is very near at hand. At a recent meeting of the "American Paper and Pulp Association" in New York two resolutions were passed, one calling on all pulp manufacturers in the United States to adopt, to the fullest extent possible, "conservative methods in lumbering according to the approved principles of the science of forestry," and the other urging State Governments "to adopt more efficient means for the prevention of forest fires." Copies of these resolutions were ordered to be sent to the forestry associations of the United States and to the Governors of the New England States, New York, Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Michigan, Wisconsin, and Minnesota.

Fortunately for Canada, the supply of pulpwood in this country is still very extensive, and if our manufacturers of pulp practise the "conservative methods" above mentioned it should decrease very slowly, if at all. There is really no necessity for any curtailment of the supply, no matter how rapidly consumption increases. The spruce grows quickly and matures early, and if only the large trees are taken for the manufacture of pulp the yearly diminution thus effected will be more than offset by the yearly increase spread over all the remaining trees of our vast spruce forests. The high prices that must shortly be offered in the United States for Canadian pulpwood and pulp should be sufficient to induce the owners of Canadian spruce areas to deal with them intelligently in their own interest.

By the adoption of gas engines the weight of boilers and much heavy machinery will be done away with, and the towering funnels or smokestacks will vanish. On account of this latter change it will be possible for her big guns to be trained through wider arcs, thus increasing the fire which she can concentrate on a given point.

One of the few Germans who served in the Confederate army during the war of the rebellion was Colonel Heros Von Borze, who died recently. Apropos of this, a Berlin weekly prints the hitherto unpublished statement that had the south been successful Prince Frederick Charles Von Hohenzollern would have been invited to be King of the southern monarchy.

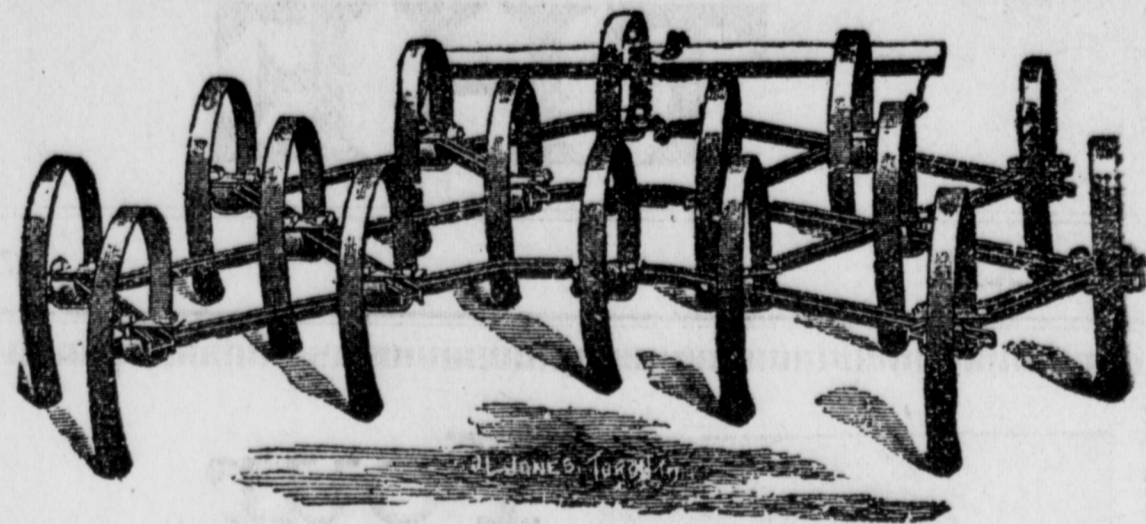
