Practical Missionary Work.

How intensely practical and sensible is
much of the modern missionary work is
shown by Dr. Wilfred T. Grenfell, the medi-
cal missionary of the Labrador coast. In a
recent address descriptive of his work he
said, "We paid more attention to benefiting
the poverty-ridden people by aiding in their
physical welfare than by preaching and
prayer. We established hospitals to care for
the sick, opened stores where clothing and
food and tobacco could be obtained at a lower
price and of a better quality than in the
regular stores. We helped to teach the fisher-
men more about their business of fishing and
the conditions under which they lived, and
how they could better the conditions; and by
so doing we accomplished a greater good
than might have been wrought by a host of
preaching and praying missionaries who
ignore men's bodies in the cure of their
souls."

The Spain of Yesterday and To-day.

In the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries
Spain owned the best part of the new world.
She had the cream of North America, and
she had almost the whole of South America,
excepting Brazil. The best of the West In-
dies were hers. Cortez poured the treasures
of Montezuma into her royal coffers, and
Pizarro, shoeing his horses with solid silver,
robbed the Incas of Peru of their gold by
the shipload. The Philippines added to
these sources of wealth, and for a long
time two great golden streams rolled across
the Atlantic and Pacific to benefit the Span-
iards. Spain was then the richest of all the
powers in her colonial possessions. To-day
by mismanagement and oppression she has
become the poorest, and since her war with
the United States, when she lost Cuba, Porto
Rico, and the Philippines, there have been
none so poor to do her reverence. Indeed,
all the land which Spain has left outside her
own boundaries is in Africa, and even there
her possessions are the rag-tag and bob-tail
of the continent.

One of the World's Greatest Forests.

The largest unbroken forest in the world,
outside of Africa, is believed to be the one
which covers 10,000 square miles of Northern
Arizona. Other forests have larger trees,
and other sections have more square miles of
trees, counting all their forested areas to-
gether, but this great stretch of yellow pine,
bordered with juniper and cedar, has few
rivals anywhere. As great forests go, this
one is not old. The average tree is reckoned
to be about 250 years old and the bulk of the
forest is counted "ripe;" that is, mature and
ready to decline in vigor. The Western yel-
low pine forms 90 per cent. of the growth.
They are from 80 to 125 feet high, but they
do not interlace; so the sunlight falls freely
on the brown needle-strewn ground. Here
and there are open parks, often hiding little
lakes in some depression. There seems no
reason for this sudden halt in the march of
the trees—unless, as the lumber packs say,
the yellow pine will not grow on the richest
soil; or, as observant foresters believe, these
open glades mark the trail of long past fires
of extreme violence. Such fire made parks
are found in the cedar and juniper forests
where their origin is positively known and of
comparatively recent date. Taking the fore-
st from end to end, it contains the most
beautiful scenery and most of the natural
wonders of Arizona. There are numerous
caves, some of them of unknown extent;
bottomless pits into which the flood waters
of sudden showers pour and are lost, and
where a stone dropped falls with no sound
of stopping. Other caves are filled with ice
that never melts, and whose extent is unde-
termined. South from the peaks the forest
grows thicker and the trees larger till the
greatest size is reached, probably, on the
Mogolian Divide around Stoneman's Lute.
Still other caves are found in the southern
trend of the forest, most of them little ex-
plored; Montezuma's Well and Castle, the
Beaver Creek soda spring, the natural bridge
at Pine Creek (the largest in the world), and
many well-preserved cliff and cave dwellings
are within the forest area.

sore on the journey, they are made in the
late autumn to practice the goose-step, first
in tar, and then through fine sand. The
geese are thus provided with perfectly fitting
pairs of boots, in which they can comfortably
perform the 200 mile march to the goose-fair
at Warsaw.

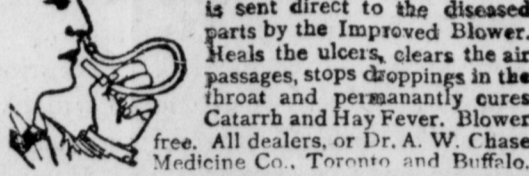

According to a recent London dispatch,
Attorney-General Sir John Lawson Walton
has stated in the House that the Lord
Chancellor has under consideration the
introduction of legislation abolishing im-
prisonment for debt.

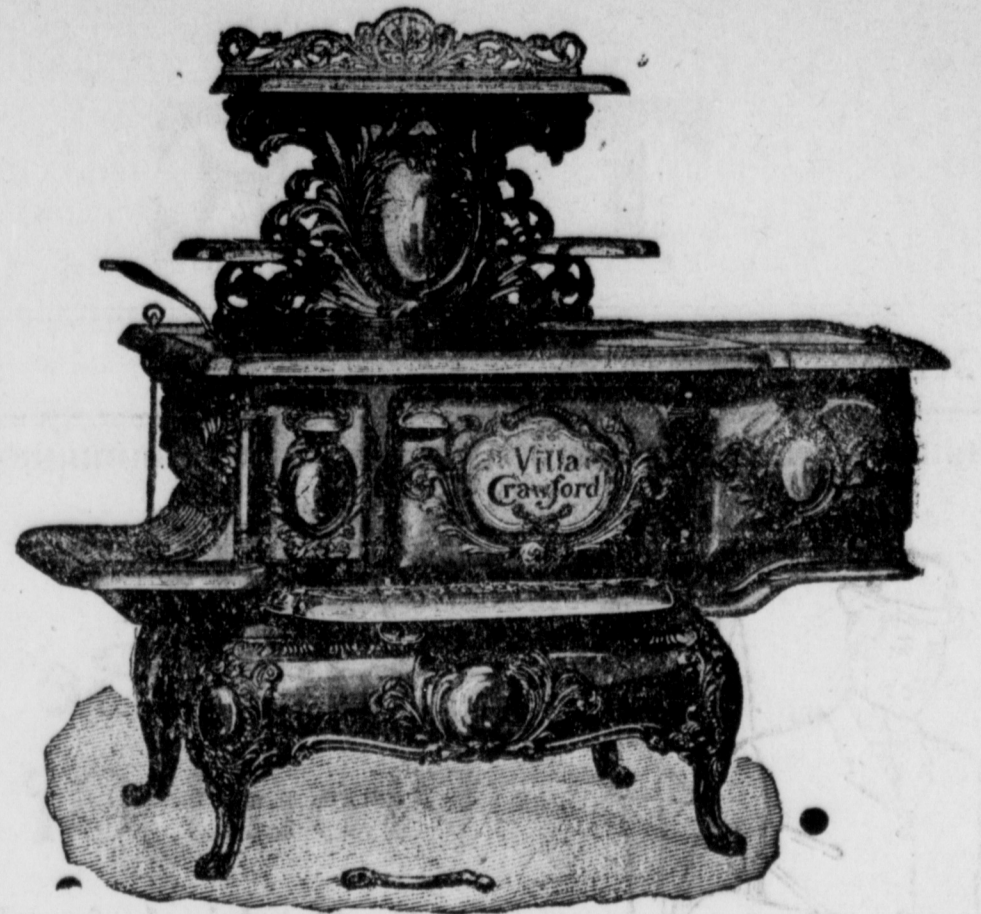
Mr. Donald Maclean, who drew this
intimation from the Attorney-General, stated
that within the last ten years 82,590 persons
have been imprisoned for non-compliance
with court orders for payment. "The
present system, according to the testimony
of nearly all the county court Judges," he
said "is the chief weapon in the hands of
firms and persons who foster among the
working classes a pernicious system of false
credit, and whose main business is to tempt
people of small means to borrow money at
ruinous rates of interest or to purchase
articles they cannot afford."

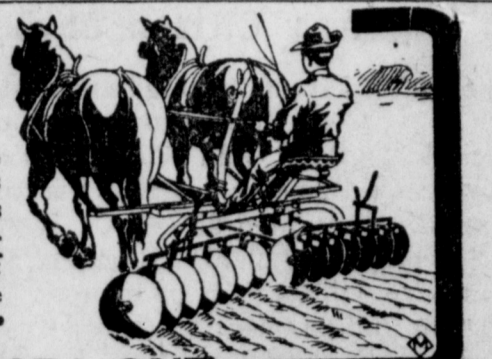
